Local track club cleans up at meet

Mississauga Track and Field Club cleaned up at the fifth Western Region Division meet last week at Orangeville.

Mississauga, which has won the Western Region Division championship for the last five years, won all eight events at the Orangeville open meet.

After four Regional meets, Mississauga was in first place with 36,805 points, ahead of Burlington which has 34,594 points. The win at Orangeville keeps the club in first.

Silkan Laumann won the girls' 800 metres in 2:26.9 with Angela Phipps

sprinting to a first place finish in the girls' 200 metres in 26.7. Both Laumann and Phipps were on the girls' 4x400-metre relay team that took first place with a time of 4:01. Maureen McGuinnis and Charmaine Curvan were the other team members.

Ken Costello, Mark Gunby, Chris Brandy and Floyd Salizar won the men's 4x400-metre relay in 3:40.

Brandy, who placed third in the 100 metres in this year's Ontario high school track and field championships, took the top spot in the men's 200

metres in 23.1. Phipps won the girls' 200 metres in 26.7.

In middle-distance running, Laumann won the girls' 800 metres in 2:26.9 while Paul Holmes took the men's 800 metres in 2:04.4.

Mississauga's track strength was also evident in the long distance events. Lisa Greenlee, the Peel 3000 metre champion, won the girls' 3000 metres in 10:34.3. Carl Burrell paced himself to win the men's 5000 metres in 15:46.

The next Regional meet is on August 6 at Burlington.

Lethargic J.J.'s drop game to Agincourt

Mayor questions meeting of PCB commission

Mayor Hazel McCallion says she doesn't understand why a provincial commission of inquiry into PCB burnings is continuing to meet "when there is nothing for them to process."

In a letter to Ontario environment minister Dr. Harry Parrott, McCallion complained of "unnecessary" hearings while the issue is before the courts.

The commission has held frequent short meetings to be updated on the progress of various court actions.

The commission's work has been held up on two fronts. The Canadian En-

vironmental Law Association has questioned its terms of reference. The city of Mississauga also passed bylaws prohibiting the test burn proposed by the environment ministry to gather information for the commission. Both challenges will be considered this fall by the Ontario Court of Appeal.

The environment ministry says it has already spent \$800,000 in direct costs to see if PCBs can be used as fuel in cement kilns at the St. Lawrence Cement plant on Lakeshore Road. The figure does not include staff costs.

While expressing concern about costs, Dr.

Parrott said in a letter to McCallion, "I do not think they should dictate any shortcuts."

The commission's work is in the best interest of the citizens of both Mississauga and Ontario, "to ensure a thorough examination of this very important issue," Dr. Parrott said.

In a letter of reply, McCallion complained the minister had not explained why the commission continues to meet when it can't proceed with its task. Its next meeting is scheduled Sept. 19.

The recent meetings have lasted only a few minutes while provincial staff give a brief update of

technical studies on PCB destruction and brief the three commissioners on the latest legal developments.

New lice weapon

Tom Reilly has given the Dufferin-Peel Roman Catholic Separate School Board a new weapon against head lice.

O'Reilly, board superintendent, and principals Marcello Lavallo and Peter Johnson have put together a package of steps to be taken before, during and after an outbreak of head lice.

The package includes health lessons for

students, fact sheets on the parasite and information letters to parents in English, French, Portuguese and Italian.

One letter, to be delivered to parents early in the school year, explains head lice are not associated with dirt and advises parents to make frequent checks of their children.

Another letter advises parents of a visit from the regional health nurse and

another explains the treatment of the infestation.

A course outline suggests teachers tell children about the parasite.

Reilly said the report to the board was done because of an unusually high incidence of head lice last winter.

Principals will receive the information packages in late August.
