## THURSDAY, February 3d, 1831.

I am commanded by his Excellency the Lieutenant
Governor to acquaint you, that his Excellency does not

Assembly, until there be a Speaker of the House of Assembly, and therefore you, Gentlemen, are to repair to the place where the House of Assembly usually sit, and there proceed to the election of a fit person to be your Speaker, whom you are to present to his Excellency here immediately for his approbation.

The Members having returned, William M'Neill, Esq. addressed Mr. Cullen, Clerk of the late House of Assembly, and proposed Ewen Cameron, Esq. to be their Speaker, which was seconded by Thomas Owen, Esq. and unanimously agreed to.

The Clerk having declared Ewen Cameron, Esq. duly elected Speaker, he was led to the Chair by Mr. W. Macneill and Mr. Owen whereupon he addressed the House as fol-

follows:-

Gentlemen,

I return you my sincere thanks for the honour you have done me in electing me your Speaker. Relying on your kind indulgence, and depending on your constant support, it is my firm determination to maintain the Rules and Privileges, and uphold the order of this House—and to conform, as far as local circumstances will admit, to the usage and practice of the British House of Commons, which, I trust, it will always be our greatest pride to imitate.
