Demented Woman Tried to Suicide

Pitched Herself Into Water Below Lower Bridge. At four-forty-five o'clock on Sunday afternoon a sad incident occurred on the east bank of the river below the lower bridge. A woman, about fifty years, had run to the bank and thrown herself into the water, about ten feet below. Mr. Harry Sweet, a boarder at Wheeler's restaurant saw the occurrence and jumped into the water, which is at this point only about three feet deep, else the woman might have drowned. Mr. Sweet supported the woman. Meanwhile the alarm was given and Sgt. Harman and Constable White proceeded to the rescue with a ladder borrowed from Mr. E. Grearick. With the aid of a rope and the ladder and the police the woman was raised to the top of the wall and removed to the police station. Dr. Gibson was called and gave temporary treatment for some cuts she sustained when she struck the bottom. She was then removed to the jail. It was learned that the woman had been for seven years an inmate of Rockwood hospital for the mentally weak. Last October she was let out but latterly had shown traces of a recurrence of her mental malady. Her friends were waiting to take her away when she gave them the slip and dashed to the river. The unfortunate lady has been taken back to Kingston.
