The Militia Dismissal. An ably written letter, signed "An Advocate," on the subject of Militia dismissals, appeared a few days ago in the Montreal Gazette, and we were glad to see men like the Gazette's correspondents in the Government.

Without following the Gazette's learned correspondent through all the branches of the subject touched upon by him, we shall endeavor to point out what we, in our opinion, the law and justice of the main question as to the right of dismissing Militiamen without a trial.

And, first, we are in a Militia law, regulating and providing for every office within its range, in full force and effect in this part of the Province; that it was duly assented to by Her Majesty, or Her Representative, the Governor General.

Colonel Fitzgibbon, a distinguished soldier, and citizen of Canada, has submitted to public consideration his impressions and opinions upon the political importance of this Colony to England.

The following article, which we extract from the New York Evening Post, gives a summary of a very important document—President Taylor's Message on the subject of the application of California for admission into the Union.

Notwithstanding the reasons, the experience, the facts, and direct evidence that the Annexation of Canada to the United States of America is essential to her salvation, it appears there are some among us, who, though no office-holders, and perhaps not expecting office, yet still think that Protection, the alteration of the Navigation Laws, or some other expediency, will save Canada from the jaws of Annexation.

The alteration in the Navigation Laws will not itself create trade throughout Canada; it will promote one branch of industry, the carrying trade, but every other branch will scarcely feel its effects. The restoration of Protection will, in like manner, produce a generally healthy trade over Canada.

The solid basis of Trade are Population, Production, and Consumption. These the United States possess in an eminent degree, and these also England possesses in a not inferior degree.

The answer to the second query is involved in the above, for if the dismission of Militiamen is not to be effected by an illegal Act, the question may not be brought before the Courts, should any officer, who has been dismissed by Lord Elgin, be prosecuted for neglect of the Militia Law.

Weekly Sittings of Superior Court. MONDAY, 28th January, 1850.

Honorable Mr. Justice SMITH, VANDELSON, MONDELLE. The Honorable Mr. Justice Smith, in the case of Clark vs. Stuart, said, that the Defendant had taken exception to the jurisdiction of the Court, the case being one over £20, and under £50; that there was a great difference of opinion among the Judges on this most important question.

The Defendant had moved, that the summons and all proceedings in the case be quashed, on the ground of want of service, the 6th section of the Act incorporating the Defendant required service to be made at the office of the Plaintiff, and that the Plaintiff had failed to do so.

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
