

AUSTRIA APOLOGIZES

London, May 22.—The Daily Mail's Bucharest correspondent says: "The Austrian government has expressed regret over an occurrence at Severin, a Roumanian frontier town, where an Austrian aeroplane dropped three bombs, wounding two Roumanian soldiers. Austria says the incident was due to the mistaking of Severin for a Serbian town, and that Roumania will be indemnified for the damage done."
