## SPLENDID FACES THESE CANADIANS

Russian Novelist Pays Tribute to Boys of the Maple Leaf.

GREAT SHOTS AND WALKERS

Siberians Are Sombre. Canucks Have Joy of Life in Them.

A fine tribute to the morale and fighting quality of the Canadian troops is paid by Nemirovitch-Danchenko, a famous Russian novelist and war correspondent who writes the London Times of his visit to the western front. He says:

"They have splendid faces, these Canadians, with a sincere and happy look. I saw them afterwards at the front, after an ordeal of forty-eight hours' stay in flooded trenches; they wore the same expression. One could see the stuff they were made of, the race that is used to relentless fighting with nature and can stand cold and hardships of which we, in the Old World, can form no idea.

"The Canadians are excellent shots and walkers; our Siberian fellows, who take aim and shoot a hare through the eye, resemble them. The quiet, the Siberian forest has made them taciturn. The Canadians on the contrary, have the joy of life in them. They waved at first under the heavy German fire, but now they form an iron wall which no fire of the enemy can break. The best quality of the Canadian soldier is calmness in attack. He is not hasty, and therefore wastes no energy.

"The relations between officers and men are too good to describe and cordial. The officers behave like senior comrades. They share with the men the hardships of trench life. The Canadians feed well and are well dressed. The Canadians are stationed the Germans have no peace day or night. The enemy has to look sharp, because in spite of all our entanglements the Canadians crawl right up to the enemy's trenches, pour down a shower of bombs, and organize little expeditions, reminding one of the times of Fenimore Cooper."

## Blinded Soldiers Well Cared For

Only Four Such Men Have Returned to Canada—Warning Issued.

Ottawa, June 5.—Mr. E. N. Scammell, Secretary of the Dominion Hospitals Commission, has issued a warning against unauthorized persons who are collecting money for the alleged aid of Canadian soldiers who have been blinded in battle. Mr. Scammell states that erroneous ideas have got around concerning the number of men blinded in the expeditionary forces. "Up to the present," he says, "our blinded soldiers have returned to Canada—not four hundred or four thousand as some people imagine. Of these four one was trained at St. Dunstan's, England, and is now earning his livelihood as an insurance agent in his home town, his typewritten letters being a model for many sighted typists. Another lives on a farm with his wife and child. The third is suffering from shock blindness and may regain his sight. This man returned from Liverpool on the Hesperian and the ship was torpedoed but he regained his sight temporarily, but has since had a relapse. He will probably recover as there is no organic trouble.

**UNAUTHORIZED AGENCIES.**  
Various agencies have been started for the collection of money in order to provide homes and special training for blinded Canadian soldiers, and unauthorized persons are making collections for this purpose. It should be distinctly understood that these collections are quite unnecessary. The Military Hospitals Commission is entirely competent to deal with all blinded soldiers who come under its care.

**A GOOD TRAINING SCHOOL.**  
All Canadian blinded soldiers are given a period of training at the Blinded Soldiers and Sailors' Home at St. Dunstan's, England, together with other blinded soldiers from the Empire forces. This place was started with fourteen blinded soldiers in March, 1915. The number has now grown until there were 140 non-coms, and men there, including five Australians, two New Zealanders and seven Canadians. The soldiers learn to read and write in Braille, to type, and to acquire some occupation useful in their future. Fifty-one men already have graduated. It is stated that the total number blinded in the British forces is only 201. "The collection of money, therefore, for the benefit of blinded Canadian soldiers," says Mr. Scammell, "also the suggestion that a special institution should be erected to care for these men, should be discouraged."

Atlantic City, N. J. June 14.—The annual joint convention of the master Car Builders, master Mechanics and Railway supply manufacturers associations opened here to-day and will continue for two weeks. Three thousand delegates from all sections of the United States and Canada are in attendance.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any one over 18 years of age, who holds a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon acquisition of the land in each of three years. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and have a house worth \$500.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$100 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and have a house worth \$500.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
