

JEWELRY CLASS REACHED IN GRAND CHALLENGE

Several Rinks Reach the Fours in Saskatchewan and Grand Challenge—Great Game Between MacIvor and Williamson—Greig's Rink Going Strong—Visitors Select Rinks for Calgary Cup Competition

(From Thursday's Morning Leader.) With the conclusion of play at a little after 1 o'clock this morning, three rinks had reached the jewelry class in the Grand Challenge competition. (Regina), Ira Partridge (Sintaluta) and Ferguson (Regina) now being in the fours in the Saskatchewan Cup, Cook, Hill and McLeod have reached the jewelry class while the Drewry is still in the six-teens stage.

BRITISH PREFERENCE TO BE UNRESTRICTED

Resolution to Confine it to Canadian Seaports Will Likely Be Modified.

(Special Despatch to The Leader.) OTTAWA, Jan. 22.—There was a Government caucus today to discuss Mr. Logan's resolution to confine the British preference to Canadian seaports. There was strong opposition to the resolution going into effect at present, as it would be a blow to British preference. The Premier has already declared himself in favor of the principle of the resolution, but his opinion is that it is premature to put it into force now.

NOT A LEGAL INDIAN. Cornelius Was Not Attached to Any Particular Band.

PETERBOROUGH, Jan. 22.—Police Magistrate W. Dumble gave judgment in a case against James Kelly, a local hotelkeeper, who is charged with having sold intoxicating liquors to Richard Cornelius, an Indian. The Magistrate held that Cornelius is two-thirds Indian, but is not an Indian under the meaning of the Indian Act, C. S. O. chap. 45. The Indian Act, "Indian" means "any male person of Indian blood reputed to belong to a particular band."

GOAL FAMINE AT BETHUNE

Farmers Burning Outbuildings—Bachelors Use Furniture for Fuel.

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POLICE STOP STREETCARS. END OF BONSPIEL

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IRA PARTRIDGE WINS THE GRAND CHALLENGE

The Crack Sintaluta Rink Captures the Premier Event of the Bonspiel—Indian Head Takes the Visitors' Cup, and L. T. McDonald, of Regina, the Consolation—Three Tie for Honours in Point Competition, With Totals of 43.

From Saturday Morning Leader. The finals were reached in three of the chief events of the Bonspiel on Saturday and the great majority of the visitors' rinks left the city for their homes. Just as last year was Regina's year, the greater proportion of the prizes falling to the home curlers, so this year may be said to be the visitors' year, no less than three of the events of the challenge being undisturbedly taken by visitors' outside rinks.

Regina's Visit. The Regina rink, which has been visiting the City Hall rink, will leave for Regina this morning.

Today's Play. Four games have been scheduled for this morning, two each in the Drewry and Calgary, and one in the 9 O'Clock Draw.

Calgary vs. Hockin. Raitlon vs. Hicks. With one or two players still to take part in this event, the scores so far show three tieing for first honors, Acaster, Gray and P. Cooper each having 43 points to their credit.

Other Events. The defeat of Mitchell by the Indians in the points competition brought the latter into the fours of the Saskatchewan and should Partridge, as is considered probable, defeat the Hill in the semi-final, the Sintaluta rink will meet what is generally held to be this year's crack Regina rink, viz. Greig, in the final, when one of the fiercest games of the whole bonspiel should be witnessed.

Points Competition. Play in the points competition was carried on No. 1 ice in the curling rink almost throughout the entire day on Saturday, a great deal of interest in the competition being (See diagrams on pages 3 and 4.)
