VOTE ON PEACE TERMS

Berlin, May 15.—The London correspondent of the Cologne Gazette says he is informed that the first business of the Boer peace delegates at the coming meeting will be an exhaustive conference between the individual delegates of the various groups. Then a vote will be taken on the main question in the following manner—The individual delegates will not vote personally as plenipotentiaries, but will give the number of their men, who will vote for or against surrender. Afterwards the chief leaders will assemble at Pretoria and conduct the final negotiations.

METHOD OF OATH

The trial of the five young men at Wallaceburg, charged with the intimidation of eleven Belgians with a view to having them cease work for the Wallaceburg Sugar Beet Company, took place yesterday before Magistrate McDougall. At the request of the crown the case was adjourned for a week for further evidence. Crown Attorney Edwin Bell, for prosecution, W. G. Richards, also of this city, for the defense.

"These Belgians," said W. G. Richards this morning, "will not swear by the Bible, but just affirm with their right hand up. A peculiar thing they have the hand closed when affirming with the exception of the first two fingers. Just like," continued the genial lawyer, "when you ask a fellow to go for a swim."

CARR VS. O'ROURKE

The following is the text of the judgment made upon motion unto this court on the 27th and 28th days of January, 1902, by counsel on behalf of the plaintiff by way of appeal from the judgment pronounced herein on the 7th day of September, 1901, by his Honor the Judge of the Surrogate Court: above named, dismissing the claim of plaintiff to have the letters of administration to the estate of the said estate granted instead to the plaintiff and in the presence of counsel for the defendant above named and upon hearing read the pleading, the evidence adduced, and the judgment having been reserved until this day.

This court doth order that the said appeal be and the same is hereby dismissed with costs to be paid by the defendant forthwith, after taxation thereof.

The Rutland Railway Company has postponed action in the purchase of the Canada Atlantic Railway till June 28.

Dr. J. A. E. Bouchard, the proprietor of a drug business at Pawtucket, R. I. shot and killed himself in the Jacques Cartier Hotel at Montreal.

Hugh Brown, the G. T. R. car repairer who lost both feet a few days ago by being run over by some cars, died at the hospital at Hamilton.

Mr. Chamberlain has authorized the despatch of a commission of experts in engineering and textiles to visit South Africa to study the openings for British trade.

The shipping combine has purchased the De Trafford estate at the Manchester terminus of the Manchester Ship Canal. Many of the combine's steamers will run to Manchester.

THE KING'S MOTORS.

London, May 15.—King Edward has now accumulated quite a collection of motor vehicles, and it has become necessary to create a new household appointment. Mr. Graham White has been offered the honorable post of "Master of the King's Motor Cars," which carries with it the distinction of driving the King and supervising all the motoring arrangements. A nominal salary is attached, but the post is really one of honor.

DROWNED HIMSELF IN WELL.

Windsor, May 15.—While suffering from an attack of mental aberration and melancholia, Moses Lebut, a prosperous farmer residing on the third concession, Sandwich East, committed suicide some time last night by drowning himself in an old disused well.

Lebut disappeared early last evening and, although diligent search was at once instituted, his lifeless body was not discovered until this morning. The unfortunate man, after leaving home, had wandered nearly two miles to the place where his body was found. He had evidently wrenched the covering from the top of the well, and, as the opening is a small one, must have exerted considerable force to push himself through the narrow aperture before dropping into the water.

Lebut was 54 years old and leaves a widow and six children.
