## GRAHAM AFTER McCOIG.

Hon. Geo. P. Graham, the Liberal leader in the Legislature, is reorganizing his small legislative phalanx on new and original lines. At the recent caucus he placed his convictions before them in a vigorous address.

Mr. Graham took the ground that the leadership does not assume all, nor necessarily the greater part of the spectacular Opposition work in the House. The leader, he held, should not seek to do it all; rather to encourage his followers to each do their share.

The Liberal leader proposes to try out all his followers, and expresses the assurance that the results will justify the experiment and put additional spirit in the Liberal party. The Toronto News credits Mr. Graham with saying:

"The duty of a leader is not to monopolize the limelight. There has been too much of a tendency to discourage and hold back the younger members. The spirit and energy rests largely with them. We hope to show the strength of the Opposition in its back benches—strength that has not yet been realized."

West Kent has a representative sitting quietly through the sessions in one of those back benches—a man who admitted himself before his election that "he would be of no use to West Kent as a back bench." It is rather cruel to find Leader Graham, a man of his own party, talking about "the strength that has not yet been realized from the back benches," especially when Mr. McCoig is trying his best to bluff through some kind of a record to establish a platform upon which to contest the next Dominion election. It is up to Mr. McCoig to either show some "strength" or else give Leader Graham a quiet tip.
