The council of Dover township met as court of revision on the assessment rolls June 6th. The members were all present. The several appeals were taken up and considered. The appellants and persons appealed against were heard in evidence.

George Crawford made a similar complaint. J. W. Shackleton's report on the proposed Woods street drain was read to the ratepayers in attendance and considered. A letter was read from John W. Young asking to have his name added to the petition for the drain, and a petition was read, signed by 19 of the original petitioners, asking to have their names withdrawn from the petition. James L. Emery was heard, and complained that James Lozon, sr., was building his fence out on Big Point road in the 10th con. A by-law was read and finally passed regulating the menner of laying out the commuted statute labor moneys on the roads in the township.

## CLEANING CARPETS.

Old and soiled carpets or rugs may be cleansed and brightened without the trouble or expense of sending them out. Take a bar of laundry soap and shave it into a quantity of water sufficient to melt it, say, a pint or perhaps a little more. Put this on the stove and let it remain until it boils or until the soap is melted. Then remove and when cool add half a bottle of house hold ammonia.

This should make a soap about the consistency of jelly. To apply to the carpet use a stiff, clean scrubbing brush dampened just a trifle and scrub the carpet vigorously. Then wipe the soap off with a damp cloth and see that the carnet is not walked over until dry more water than is absolutely neces

The effect of this treatment is really surprising, the carpets looking as wel and sometimes better than when done at the cleaner's. Bagdad curtains and oriental rugs may be cleaned in th same manner, care being taken not to leave the soap on long enough to make the colors run.

### KITCHEN HELPS.

If borax is added to the water dishkeep them a nice color.

Don't keep the drafts open when you are not using the fire. It not only burns away the coal, but ruins the firebrick as well.

Cement the seams and edges of the kitchen linoleum if durability is wantprevents water from running under it Cracks in a cooking stove can be satistactorily filled by a paste made of six parts of common wood ashes to one part of table salt mixed with cold water. Properly mixed it will prove lasting and will take blacking

To clean oily cruet bottles, etc., put a few strips of blotting paper in the same quantity of warm water and a piece of washing soda. Shake a few times and rinse in warm water.

The Bean Bag For Children. The advantages of the bean bag as an exerciser for children are sung by a physician in one of the magazines. He suggests that the nurse or mother play with the child or children, so that the sport be regulated as to time and energy, the number of tosses to be increased from day to day and week to week. To begin with, both hands may be used, then one at a time, but the left hand and arm should have the same amount to do as the right, A small medicine ball may follow after proficiency has been attained with the

To Freshen Kid Slippers. White or colored kid slippers often become shabby in appearance because the kid has been peeled off the heels. If the slippers are otherwise in good condition the heels can be made to look condition the heels can be made to look like new by cutting from the top of an old glove of the same color a piece of kid large enough to stretch and paste about the heel. The upper edge can be securely pushed under the sole of the shoe and neatly trimmed at the bottom. If not worn until perfectly dry the result is most satisfactory.

Petate Griddle Cakes.

Left over mashed potatoes can be made into dainty and wholesome gridmade into dainty and wholesome grid-dle cakes. The potatoes are first of all to be "riced," then mixed with the beaten yolks of two eggs (for three pints of potato), the whites to be whipped thoroughly, as for meringue, and added next. Enough thrice sifted four to make the batter firm and one pinch of sugar to insure prompt brown-ing is all that is necessary. Served with jam or maple sirup they will be found very delicious.

Peeling Tomatees.

Nearly every cook or recipe book says, "Pour boiling water over ripe tomatees, then skin them," but this is a very vague direction. The correct way to peel tomatees is to cover them with boiling water for half a minute, then lay them in cold water until perfectly cold, and the skin can be peeled off without difficulty, leaving the tomatees unbroken and as firm as they were before being scalded.
