## WHAT SHALL THE TITLE BE?

The Globe and Montreal Witness are disagreeing as to the title which rightly belongs to a member in a Provincial Legislature. The Globe says it should be M.P.P., while the Witness thinks M.L.A. would be better. What they are called makes little difference so long as they do their work in the interests of the people.—Brockville Recorder.

The remark of the Recorder is right in one respect, but the attempt to introduce M. L. A. as the abbreviation for member of the Legislative Assembly has proved unsuccessful so long that the Globe's contention is likely to prevail, points out the Stratford Beacon. Is there any good reason why a member of the Provincial Legislature should not be called an M. P. P. while a member of the House of Commons is called an M. P.? Each is a member of Parliament, the Parliament being in one case that of the whole country, in the other that of the Province. M. P. for member of Parliament is easily understood to apply to a member of the Legislative body for the Dominion, M. P. P. to apply to a member of the Provincial Parliament. If a member of the Legislative Assembly is to have his designation abbreviated to M. L. A., then a member of the House of Commons ought to have the letters M. H. C. added to his name. No person thinks of doing that.

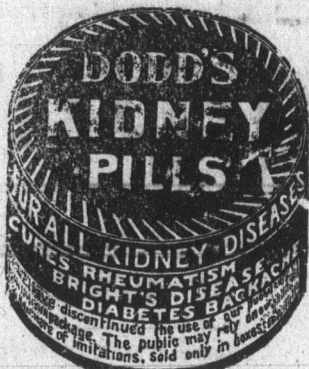
