The getting of options at Edmundston has been stopped or held up, rumor has it, while in this vicinity there has been some activity for a few days in the real estate market, stimulated by the business proportions of a class of people who are supposed to be in close touch with those who know what the movements of the pulp enterprise are to be. In this connection the rumor goes that there was some understanding between the leaders of the Opposition party, or others in their confidence, and the Frasers Limited before the general elections, by which the Frasers, in whom American capital has recently become intesested in the pulp enterprise, were to get control of the Grand Falls power if the Opposition succeeded to office.
