HARTLAND COVERS TOO MUCH GROUND

Is Opinion of Council and Board-
aries May Be Reduced—Street
Names

The regular meeting of the Town Council was held on Monday evening the Mayor in the chair and all the aldermen present except Alderman Pritton.

The Marshall reported that the last month had been very quiet, that he had assisted three intoxicated men home, hauled two tramps out of the town, and collected a \$34 tax from the proprietor of a local institution.

The Treasurer reported receipts of \$49.95, \$443 issue in checks, bank balance of \$955, and that 645 feet of water pipe had been laid on the hill at a total cost of about \$1350.

The delinquent taxes were about \$646, and it was ordered that execution be issued at once.

Alderman Aiton for the committee of naming the streets submitted the following report which was adopted, and the names given will be the official names of the streets in future:

Main, Maple, and Hill Crest retain their present names. The street between Main street and the river will be known as Water street. The street on the east side of the railway will be known as Brighton street.

From Frank Hagerman's to the Reformed Baptist grave yard will be known as High street. On the west side of the Railway will be known as Carleton street. From Morgan's corner to the Cross Creek is Rockland Road. Depot street will be known as King street. Bradley street as Queen and Forester street is Prince street.

On motion of Alderman Aiton seconded by Alderman Morgan section 17 of by-law 13 was amended so as to permit invalids in wheel chairs to use the side walks.

Alderman McIntosh for the committee to interview the local government in reference to the Rockland Road reported that Mr. McCain informed him that the Minister of Public Works had intimated very plainly that it would be useless to approach the government and that the delegation would be wasting their money.

Guy O. McGinley and M. W. White were heard in reference to the condition of the road and protested against the circumstances under which incorporation had been brought about.

Alderman McIntosh suggested reducing the boundaries of the Town and committee was appointed to consider the matter, and to report at the next meeting, namely, the mayor, Alderman McIntosh and Aiton, and the clerk.

HOW TO MARK YOUR BALLOT ON JULY 10

Put the Crosses in the First And
Last Spaces if You Want Real
Prohibition in N. B.

A copy of the official ballot which will be used on Saturday, July 10, in the plebiscite on prohibition is given here in order that each voter may be familiar with its form and may determine how to mark it when he or she enters the polls. The voter who wants to cast a ballot for the retention of the present prohibitory act and against the sale of beer and wine, should place the crosses as shown herewith, thus:

First Prohibition Prohibition Act	X
Second Prohibition Prohibition Act	
For Sale of Light Wines and Beer under Government Control	
Second Sale of Light Wines and Beer	X

Conditions in New Brunswick cannot be improved by voting against prohibition or for beer and wine. If the present act is not entirely satisfactory it can be improved, but no good can be achieved by voting against it.

The sale of beer and wine would make drunkenness more prevalent and cause untold misery—and it would not stop the illegal sale of stronger drink, nor the use of lemon extract by those who want more potent drinks.

No one who votes for prohibition and against beer and wine need fear the reproach of conscience.
