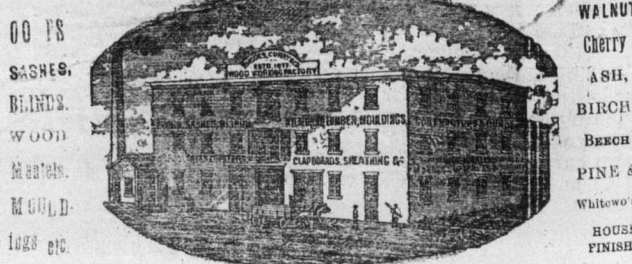

A NIGHT'S ADVENTURE.

Some years ago important business summoned me to Spain and forced me to live nearly a year in Andalusia. At that time I was hardly twenty-three years old. Instead of confining myself to Cadiz, the streets of which are narrow and dirty, I went to Puerto-Real, a pretty town with white houses pierced by an indefinite number of windows, behind the blinds of which, at every hour of the day, you see black eyes sparkling and red lips smiling. So my time passed in the most pleasant manner in the world. Neglecting my business more than I should have done, I made many pleasant acquaintances, and only sought to amuse myself. Still, three or four times a week, I picked up my courage, tore myself away from my delicious retreat, and mounted on a magnificent jaquet, galloped the three leagues between Puerto-Real and Cadiz, and looked into my business, much more to discover how much longer I could enjoy the delicious life I had organized, than for the serious interests which had been entrusted to me. At this time much was said about a certain highwayman, Jose Maria, who had for a long time, scourged the highway of Spain, and who, having made peace with the government, had retired to Cadiz, his native place, there to enjoy quietly and honorably the fruits of his career of robbery. This ex-bandit had awakened in me a keen curiosity and a great desire to meet him. One morning I received a letter from one of my companions, named Don Toribio Quesada, announcing that the famous Jose Maria was to dine with him that evening at Cadiz, and urging me not to lose the opportunity of seeing and conversing with the old bandit. Bounding with joy at the unexpected news I had my horse saddled at once, and rode towards Cadiz at full speed. Two hours later I was comfortably installed in Don Toribio's drawing room. Jose Maria was punctual. He was the sort of a man I expected to see. He was such as my imagination had represented him, and the few hours I spent in his company were very enjoyable, and seemed to pass with the speed of a dream so strongly was I impressed on hearing him relate, with his grave and sonorous voice, and with the expansion and frankness of a superior man, the stirring adventures of his adventurous life. Finally, when to repeat to Jose Maria led to, after a parting glass of wine and after having shaken hands with me in a friendly way. When I found myself alone with Don Toribio he invited me to pass the night with him, for it was getting dark and I was three leagues from Puerto-Real. But I perished in setting out. Wrapping myself in my cloak I set out for my horse's side and galloped off. The night was dark, and the atmosphere was hot and heavy. Big drops of rain were beginning to fall, and at intervals deep growls of thunder were heard in the distance, preceded by flashes of lightning. I advanced fearfully along the solitary road, my head full of the gloomy stories which Jose Maria had been telling all the evening without stopping, and my eyes wandered about me anxiously, seeking to pierce the obscurity and fortify me against the specters that might be set for me by the *Caballeros de la Noche* (Cavaliers of the night) who at that period swarmed on all the highways of Andalusia. I was armed, and notwithstanding my apprehensions, I had too often ridden from Cadiz to Puerto-Real not to know what to think about the subject of fear, but this night, with my head stuffed with a number of lamentable stories, I was a prey to unaccountable terrors. Of what was I afraid? I know not—or, rather, to tell the truth, I was afraid of everything. Meanwhile the weather had become detestable. The sky had changed to a gloomy sheet of fire; incessant flashes of lightning spread a livid and fantastic light; the rain fell in torrents; and finally the tempest, which had been threatening a long time, burst forth in fury. My horse shied, and stumbled at every step in the midst of this convulsion of nature, and I was obliged to watch him with the greatest care to avoid being dropped in the mud. I was literally drenched by the rain, and I cursed my misadventure in facing Don Toribio's obliging offer and choosing this time to plough along blind roads in the middle of the night. I came near breaking my neck twenty times, and I was nearly at my wits' end, when I remembered an old building that could not be far off, and which might afford a temporary shelter from this tempest. I laid my course as well as I could in the pitchy darkness, and succeeded,

A Pressing and Difficult Problem.

The vast flood of foreigners that pour ceaselessly into this country, and its equal participation in the government after very inadequate preparation for the duties and responsibilities of citizenship, is one of the most pressing and difficult of our public problems. In some American cities, the proportion of voters who do not know our language, to whom our history and traditions are absolutely unknown, who have no conception of political duty or responsibility, and no care for them or interest in them, is enormous. This most intelligent American who should settle in another country could not and would not ask, before he knew the language and had familiarized himself with the history and character of the country and people, and of the nature and methods of their political institutions, to take an active part in the government, nor would an intelligent people permit him to do so. Our naturalization laws were framed long before the question was of any importance. But it has now become of vital importance, and those laws should be revised in the interest of the perpetuity of free institutions.—*Harper's Weekly.*

Home-Returning Chinamen.

Forward, between decks, are more than a hundred Chinese steerage passengers—mostly repining in their rough wooden bunks, since it is too cold and rough upon deck for them. Some chat, some sleep, many are smoking opium; a few are gambling. At a low table covered with a bamboo mat, the game of *fan-tan* is being played by the light of three candles. A silent ring of watchers and wagers press closely about the table, from surrounding bunks, others looking on, and the yellow candle glare, coloring all these impassive faces, makes their placid rose-smile seem as the smiling of gilded idols in some mysterious pagoda. Deep in the hold below, sixty square boxes are,—much resembling tin-chests, covered with Chinese lettering. Each contains the bones of a dead man—bones being sent back to melt into the Chinese soil from whence, by nature's vital chemistry, they were shaped. . . . And those whose labelled bones are plucked to and fro in the dark below, as the plunging steamer rocks and shudders, once also passed this ocean in just such a ship,—and smoked or dreamed their time away in just such berth,—and played the same strange game by such a yellow light in even just such an atmosphere, heavy with vaporized opium. Very silent the playing is. . . . Scarcely a word is spoken despite the losses or gains. From the deck overhead, an old chant echoes loudly down,—the chant of the Chinese crew. First one utters a snarling sharp cry, like a cat's cry of anger—*Yow-ye!* Then all the others shrill together *Yow-ye!* as they pull at the ropes. "Joss paper" has been thrown about,—doubtless to propitiate the gods of that most eastern East to which we yesterday sailed. Perhaps those ancient gods will hearken to the prayers of their patient worshippers, and make smooth the menacing face of this turbulent sea.—*Harper's Magazine.*
