AMY, 2.091-4 WILL BE RACED IN EAST

Was One of the Sensations of Bay State Circuit—Another Bay Stater at St. Stephen

 Amy, 2.094, raced the past two seasons by trainer John W. Page, Providence, R. I., will be given a change of scenery. Trainer Charles Masco, of Houlton, Me., will pit her against the 2.15 pacers of the Maine and Maritime circuits.

The above probably refers to Amy, 2.094, which made a sensational campaign on the Bay State Circuit in 1919. The National Trotting Association's win list, just published with the 1921 racing rules, shows she made her win record of 2.094 that year and she would therefore be eligible to the 2.12 class and not the 2.15 this year.

Peter Moore at St. Stephen.
 Commenting upon the new member of Billy Keys' stable at St. Stephen the Breeder says:

"The seven-year-old Peter the Great trotter, Peter Moore, out of Lena Moore, by Hindler-Wilkes, 2.204, a member of the Lester Dore stable during the early part of the 1920 Bay State Circuit season, is at St. Stephen, N. B., in charge of W. H. Keys, for whom the Atlantic Express mare, Sakia, 2.15½, has been racing so good the past two seasons. Peter Moore has been mentioned on the ice through out the present winter, stepping quarters around 30, and Mr. Keys is so pleased with the chestnut gelding's present soundness and general manners in company that another good winner for Peter the Great in Peter Moore may be expected before the end of the coming racing season."

May Race in Cape Breton.
 D. L. Dolan, of the Sydney Record, tells of a well-founded report that Miss Fantasy, 2.104, daughter of Allwood, has been purchased by a well-known Gloucester Bay man, and will arrive at her new home May 20th. Miss Fantasy, now 11 years old, took her record in 1919 at Reading, Pa., winning the first and second heats, but was beaten in the sixth heat by Tommy Hoyt. Miss Fantasy started 17 times that season in the States of Maryland, North Carolina, Pennsylvania and Virginia. She was a consistent performer too, and many of her races were five and six heats. Miss Fantasy won two or three of the extra heat variety.

In the exchange which takes from Boston the last of that great trio of outfielders—Hooper, Speaker and Lewis—the Red Sox veterans, as ages go in major league baseball, but the oldest of the trio is the man who made the best record last season as a hitter, namely, John Collins.

SPRING BASEBALL SERIES STARTED

Upwards of Seventy Inter-League Games Scheduled for the Major Leaguers

New York, March 7.—Inter-League spring exhibition games between the clubs of the major circuits will be in full swing within the next few days, giving baseball fans their first opportunity to compare the relative strength of the rival pennant combinations. The development of this feature of the southern training expeditions has made marked advance during recent seasons. The schedules show that a big percentage of the sixteen clubs, composing the National and American Leagues, will play such contests previous to the opening of the 1921 pennant races.

A study of the auto-season dates of the major league teams indicate a list of more than 70 such games scheduled and with favorable weather conditions during March and April, fully two-thirds of these contests will probably be played. A large majority are carded for the south and southwest, although several of the clubs will complete their spring training with a series of home games just before the opening of the regular season.
 The exhibition schedule opened Saturday with contest between the Philadelphia Athletics and the St. Louis Nationals at Houston, Tex., where they played again Sunday before moving on the Beaumont, Tex., for today and tomorrow. For the last five weeks, one or more such events are scheduled for decision each day. Two city series are involved for the St. Louis and the Philadelphia clubs will each figure in games on their home grounds just before the opening of the pennant chase.
