But many farmers are sadly in need of that best -experience, and the consequence is we often see hay fed to stock that is only fit for litter. Hay that has ripened its seed is less nutritious than straw that has been cut when the grain is still not too ripe. Canadian farmers can have hay for their stock fully as good as any saved in England. 


