Experts Give Figures

According to Estimates Canada Produced 15,000,000 Bushels More Than United States

Bradstreet's returns of stocks of wheat held on December 16 in this country and Canada, east and west of the Rocky mountains, and Europe, also the stocks of corn and of oats held in the United States and Canada, with comparisons for the preceding week and the like week of 1915, are as follows, figures being in bushels:

World's crop figures—More exact details on world crop figures than were contained in press dispatches from Rome give estimates of the international institute of Agriculture were received from the institute today by the department of agriculture as follows:

Argentina: Wheat 77,394,000 bushels, a decrease of 55.2 per cent. from last year; oats 33,510,000 bushels, a decrease of 55.4 per cent.; linseed 5,290,000, a decrease of 75.6 per cent.

Australia: Wheat 148,326,000 bushels, an increase of 4 per cent. over last year.

France: Wheat 214,424,000 bushels, a decrease of 3.7 per cent. from last year; oats 284,296,000, an increase of 19.2 per cent.; barley 39,405,000, an increase of 24 per cent.

A COSTLY LICENSE
The chinch-bug costs our wheat growers \$100,000,000 annually; the Hessian fly \$200,000,000. Potato growers spend \$17,000,000 a year for poison sprays to kill the potato-bug. A quail killed in Ohio, had in its stomach 1200 chinch-bugs; another, killed in Kansas, had in its stomach 2000 Hessian flies. A representative of the Massachusetts State Agricultural College estimates that a quail destroys annually 75,000 potato-bugs.

MONEY AS WELL AS MEN
During the twelve months ending with October, Canadians spent about \$300,000,000 or 70 per cent. more for foreign merchandise than during the previous year. This expenditure for imported goods—evidently luxuries because we did without them when we were short of money—represents a sum which, if invested in a national loan, would prove an important factor in the war finances of Canada and the empire. From the economic standpoint this is more important than what we may spend for our own products, especially when the latter is on the basis of what we are getting for our exports. In the conduct of the great campaign money is just as important as men. 1917

Sittings of the Supreme Court of Alberta, Appellate Division, and for the trial of causes, Civil and Criminal, and for the hearing of motions and other civil business, will be held at the following times and places for the year 1917. When the date set for the opening of a Court or a Sitting is a holiday, such Court or Sitting shall commence on the day following such holiday.
