Just before 6 p.m., yesterday as Conductor Eli Lilly, of Street Car No. 2, was standing at the foot of Adelaide Street, on Water Street, and in the act of reversing the trolley pole on his car he was run down by a runaway horse to which he had his back turned and which, of course, he did not see until it was upon him. The man was thrown to the ground, the carriage went over him and the reins becoming entangled in his legs dragged him along Water Street until opposite Mr. P. J. Shea's grocery when he became disoriented. People who witnessed the accident thought the man had been killed outright and soon a crowd collected. The man who was covered with mud was unconscious and was borne by Const. Greene and others into Mr. Shea's store where stimulants were administered and where Dr. Tait attended him. The man had a nasty cut on the forehead, he was hurt about the body and one of his arms was badly sprained. He only recovered consciousness on reaching his home where Dr. Anderson attended him. The horse took fright at Alexander Street and as it came down Water Street at a gallop

LONDON, Dec. 3.

Adrianople was the obstacle which threatened to wreck negotiations when they first opened. The Turks refused to consider surrender of the stronghold. When the Bulgarians subsequently yielded this point, the Greek delegates demanded time in which to submit the question to Athens. The reason for this is not far to seek. It is obvious that if the Bulgarians sacrifice possession of Adrianople in the interests of peace, they will expect their allies to share their sacrifice, and this can only be done by giving Bulgaria compensation in the shape of territory conquered by Greeks, Servians and Montenegrins, which they have staked out for themselves. The Greeks anticipate that if Turkey ultimately retains Adrianople, Bulgaria will more actively dispute the Hellenic claim to Saloniki. The firm attitude of Turkey as to Adrianople is shown by a telegram from the Sultan to King Ferdinand to the effect that while he is prompted by the most peaceful motives, he will be unable to renounce Turkey's hold on Adrianople, which all Ottomans consider as a Mohammedan sanctuary. Diplomats in all European countries are anxious to see real peace negotiations begun. They consider there will then be a better chance of reaching a settlement of the Austro-Servian dispute, which is still worrying the nerves of Europe.

Toronto, Nov. 28.—Ovid Latremouille, once champion athlete of the Toronto force, was yesterday sentenced to seven years in Kingston Penitentiary by Chief Justice Sir William Munk. The charge was robbery while carrying an offensive weapon.
