There is no "make-believe" about utilizing as much daylight as we can get and of wasting as little as possible. It is quite as casy for the clock to say the time is 6 p.m. as to say the same hour is 5 a.m. The clock is merely an instrument to do our bidding. In the same way it would be quite right to call January July, or vice versa, if it were thought expedient to do so, or if the "children" who "materialized their imaginations" had called them so in the first place. Imagination, we are told, is a vanishing gift, but it would require a very small glimmering of the gift indeed to see through that sort of lie. As a matter of fact, the principle of the Bill has been in operation in some places for the last three years, standard time being advanced one hour in May and put back in October. All obeveryone is agreed upon the benefit gained during the summer months.

In England the Bill has received the support of 285 members of Parliament, and 50 members of the House of Lords have also expressed their good will towards the Bill-513 popularly elected bodies comprising four county councils and 509 City Corpora-

tions and Town and District Councils, 67 Chambers of Commerce. The Associated Chambers of Commerce—43 Trade Unions and 483 Societies, Associations and Clubs have passed resolutions in support of the Bill, and have communicated the same to His Majesty's Government.

The above mentioned popularly elected bodies represent a poulation of about 24,000,000. The Bill is supported by the following Railway Com Midland, London & South Western, Widland, London & South Western, ondon, Brighton and South Coast, Great Central, Furness, and Caledon-

The Canadian Bill was referred to Select Committee, who, after taking evidence, reported in favor of the Bill The Select Committee appointed by the Parliament of Victoria, after examining 62 witnesses, reported in favour of the Bill and recommended its adoption through the Commonwealth. adding that "if the other (Australian) States should not agree to adopt the Bill, the advantages arising from its adoption in this State (Victoria) would so greatly outweigh any disadvantages" that they recommended "that it should become law in Victoria" and they were "convinced it would give their industrial population such an advantage that the other States would necessarily have to fall

In New South Wales a Parliamentary Select Committee has been appointed, and has commenced to hear

In South Australia, in July 1911, a deputation waited upon the Premier with reference to a Daylight Bill for that State. The Premier said he was in favour of such a Bill and would ndeavour to secure its introduction as a Government measure.
