### Bad for the Teeth.

Quicksilver miners follow the most unhealthy trade in the world. The fumes of the mercury produce constant salivation, and the system becomes permeated with the metal; the teeth of the unfortunate men drop out, they lose their appetite, become emaciated, and as a rule seldom live longer than two years.

Chloride of lime, employed by bleachers, frequently destroys the enamel and dentine of the teeth. But phosphorus, used so largely in the manufacture of lucifer matches, affects a very large number of persons,

women, girls, and children greatly preponderating.

People who work in soda factories are affected by the teeth becoming soft and translucent; they break off close to the gums.

Dr. Hesse, of Leipzig, states that bakers are likely to suffer from decayed teeth on account of flour entering the mouth during work collecting on and around the teeth, where it decomposes and generates an acid destructive to the dentine.

### Visit of Prince Albert.

Prime Minister's Office, St. John's, Newfoundland, June 11th, 1913.

Dear Sir,—I am directed to forward you the enclosed, at the request of His Excellency the Governor, for publication in the Telegram.

H. M. S. Cumberland, Captain Aubrey Smith, M. V. C., having His Royal Highness Prince Albert on board as a Cadet, will, on the completion of a tour of Canadian Ports, visit St. George's Bay on the 20th instant. During the stay of the ship on the West Coast, the Prince may have the opportunity of fishing on some of the rivers which afforded such good sport to his Royal Father, The King, on the occasion of His Majesty's visits to Newfoundland. The Prince does not make any official appearance during this cruise of the Cumberland the object of which is to benefit His Royal Highness for the Naval Service of his country. Nor is any distinction made between him and other Cadets who are undergoing a busy course of educational training on the Cumberland.

The Governor has, however, accepted, on behalf of Captain Aubrey Smith, the thoughtful and kindly offer of the Vice-President of the Reid Newfoundland Company to place an engine and some private cars at the Captain's disposal while on the West Coast. This proposal will be a great convenience to the Officers and Cadets in moving from point to point along the Coast at such times as the routine of work will allow them a chance of some fishing. The Prince will be granted leave to go a-fishing under exactly the same regulations as any other Cadet.

As none of the Officers have visited the Coast before, Captain Douglas Beech, A.D.C., who is shortly leaving on a fishing expedition to St. George's Bay, will accompany those going fishing to the best pools where sport may be obtained.

On Saturday, the 28th instant, H. M. S. Cumberland will arrive at St. John's and will stay until Wednesday, the 2nd of July, where the cruise terminates and the ship hurries home to take part in the fleet manoeuvres in Home waters.

The Prince's visit to our Capital is absolutely unofficial, and His Royal Highness is here strictly in the capacity of a Cadet in the Royal Navy. No honors are paid nor may the Prince take part in any official functions. Moreover, the rules of the Service preclude Cadets from accepting invitations to evening entertainments, so a Ball at Government House which had been fixed for the 1st of July will be postponed until a date later in that month.

Following the usual procedure, Captain Smith will pay an official call on the Governor soon after the arrival of the "Cumberland" in harbor; and the Governor will return the captain's visit in person on the same day. It is probable that the Prince will come on shore later with the captain and go up to Government House and the people of Newfoundland who are famous throughout the Empire for their devoted loyalty to the Royal House, will have ample opportunities of seeing the Prince in whose future career in the service of King and Country all of us will feel a deep and abiding interest.

The Prince may be free to accept luncheon at Government House or be present at an afternoon reception but, as Cadets are not permitted to sleep on shore, His Royal Highness will not occupy the rooms which are known as the Prince of Wales' Rooms, and were occupied by Their Majesties the King and Queen and by His Majesty's revered father, the late King Edward VII. The Prince will, however, visit the rooms and will see the Bible which was specially placed there on the occasion of the first Royal Visit and is treasured as a memento of that auspicious occasion.

It is not improbable that, on the way to and from Government House the carriage may follow a route which will enable the Prince to traverse the principal streets of the city, and to see the Capital of Newfoundland and the people of a Colony whose devotion to the Crown is not excelled in any other portion of the King-Emperor's Dominions.
