Going Back a Year.

Trinity, Feb. 13th, 1814. Mr. Robert Slade. Sir,—A young man of the House of Attwood & Haynes, of St. John's, being here on his way from the northward to St. John's overland, I avail myself of the opportunity (although it is not likely he will reach that place before the Spring) of just in-forming you that all is well with us

I have nearly the whole of the Swallow's and Mary's crews engaged for the Ice, and as Seal Oil has lately been so much in demand I shall forego the advantages of the Cosmopolite's remaining at home to cruise and shall send her also if I can get her a master and crew.

The Swallow will be launched the first favourable opportunity of tide and clear water.

My last letter (copy of which I do My last letter (copy of which I do not send by this opportunity it being so uncertain) was No. 22 per Amy, Capt. Bloomfield, which I hope you have received. As yet nothing has been done in the seal fishery in this neighbourhood. We heard the beginning of this month, overland from St. John's, of the great success of the Allies in Germany, of Lord Wellington's being in Bordeaux, of the Dutch having risen and that the Scheldt Fleet had joined the British Flag. I hope it may be true. I fear all our fish went off too early to market, and I now wish I had sent the Gannet to Poole instead of Lisbon. I should have done so but was afraid of the Insurance in case of accident. In hopes of seeing a vessel from you early and of being able to get out a third schooner to the Ice, I remain


