

Poorly Paid.

(Morning Chronicle.)
It is a distressing fact that one
of the most important professions
which attracts men and women of
talent and self-sacrificing service is
the lowest paid. This is strikingly
illustrated by statistics recently
compiled by the National Bureau of
Education of the United States,
which show that teachers and pro-
fessors, numbering over 600,000 in
that country, are the poorest paid
of any profession. It is natural,
then, that many of them are seeking
the larger rewards which com-
mercial and industrial pursuits offer
them.
Representative colleges, numbering
256 and located both in large cit-
ies and in the country, employing
8,030 teachers, expended two years
ago in salaries \$43,888,942, which,
apportioned pro rata without con-
sideration of individual ability or ex-
perience, amounts to \$1,667, or a lit-
tle more than \$2 a week for each
teacher. On this meagre sum a pro-
fessor is expected to marry, raise
and educate his family, and assume
the position in the social and econ-
omic system to which his attainments
as a scholar entitle him. The Na-
tional Industry Commission appoint-
ed by President Wilson found that
the cost of living has advanced 71 to
83 per cent. during the past five
years in that country. To meet this
increase the wages of unskilled labor
have advanced 50 to 75 per cent., but
only seven States have raised the
salaries of teachers during the same
period in State colleges and univer-
sities. The remaining forty-one
States have made no attempt to in-
crease the salaries of the teaching
staffs.
In order to pay the leaders of edu-
cation at least a living wage, there
is now a movement in the United
States to increase the salaries of
professors by 50 per cent., which
would require an additional annual
expenditure of \$6,984,711. The pre-
sent endowments, both private and
State, amount to \$243,651,640, and it
is estimated that to provide for this
increase in salaries and to liquidate
the debts of the colleges there will
be required an additional endowment
of \$140,141,930. This seems a large
amount, but, as the Toronto Globe
says, it is required to make democ-
racy safe for the world, and is really
insignificant in comparison with
the amounts raised during the war
to make the world safe for democ-
racy. Canada has the same prob-
lem to meet and the same duty to
discharge to its noble band of teach-
ers.

Highway Robbery.

Man Seizes Woman's Purse on Sack-
ville Street.
A young man who gives his name
as Edward Skanes, and belongs to
Newfoundland, was arraigned in the
police court this morning on a charge
of robbery with violence. He was
remanded until Monday for trial.
About nine o'clock last evening a
Miss Sampson was passing down
Sackville street between Granville
and Hollis streets, when she felt a
grip on her arm and a man tried to
get her mesh bag from her. She held
on to it and the man pounded on her
arm and finally the chain broke and
the man ran down the hill with the
bag, which contained over \$5.
She notified officer Collins and gave
a description of the man. Collins rang
up the police station and officer West-
on responded. The two then went
down to Water street in different di-
rections and Weston came upon a
man resembling the robber, and
later Miss Sampson identified him.
He was then locked up.—Halifax Re-
corder, Sept. 10.


