## TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

### DEFAULTING PAYMENT.

PARIS, May 4. The Reparations Commission has addressed a letter to the German War Burdens Commission, recapitulating correspondence with regard to the obligation, resting upon Germany, to pay an equivalent of twenty million gold marks before May 1. The letter says that Germany is in default to the extent of at least twelve million marks.

### A STRIKE APPEAL.

LONDON, May 4. An appeal to the whole labour movement to support miners was issued last night by a joint committee of the Parliamentary Labor Party, National Labor Party, Executive and Parliamentary Committee of Trade Union Congress.

### CAUSE OF PERPLEXITY.

LONDON, May 3. Financial clauses to be included in the Allied ultimatum to Germany caused the Supreme Allied Council great perplexity to-day. There were wide differences of opinion relative to German guarantees. Prince Sapieha, Polish Foreign Minister, has arrived here in connection with a decision incident to the determination of the frontier between Poland and Germany in Upper Silesia.

### TROUBLE BREWING.

ATHENS, May 3. Serious conflicts have occurred between Albanians and Greeks at Coriza, a city on the border between Macedonia and Albania. Eleven Greeks are reported to have been killed and wounded. Greek newspapers say the disturbance was due to French and Italian influence, and it is said the Greek Government considers sending an army to occupy the disturbed area.

### THE RESCUE SHIP.

SKATTLE, May 3. United States army transport Buford was to-night steaming down Puget Sound for Seattle, bearing on board sixty-five passengers and members of crew of the Japanese steamer Tokuyasu Maru, rescued when that steamer burned off Oregon Coast last night, with a possible loss of eight lives. Twenty-six survivors were confined to Buford's Hospital suffering from exposure. One member of Maru's crew died in a lifeboat, while being taken to the Buford, and seven others, menaced by the advancing flames, leaped into the ocean and it is believed were drowned.

### HOPEFUL SITUATION.

WASHINGTON, May 3. A conference to be held to-morrow, of all parties to the Marine Labor Controversy, is under consideration, according to Chairman Benson of the Shipping Board to-night. Secretary of Labor Davis has been in charge of the Government's efforts to end the controversy since yesterday, and the situation now looks very hopeful.

### OPTIMISM EXPRESSED.

INDIANAPOLIS, May 3. Optimism over progress of strikes to enforce demands for a forty-four hour week job-in-job and book printing offices throughout the country, was expressed by International Typographical Union officials here to-day. Strike reports received from one hundred and twenty-five local unions show four thousand five hundred men out. J. W. Hayes Secretary said. The whole number of men affected by the strike will be a few less than a thousand he estimated.

### AGREEMENT REACHED.

LONDON, May 3. Sir Eric Geddes, Minister of Transportation, announced to-day that Government had reached an agreement with railwaymen, by which it would pay fifty one million for pounds sterling in complete satisfaction of all claims growing out of war time agreements. The Government's liabilities were originally put at one hundred and fifty six million pounds sterling.

### MORE DAYLIGHT SAVING.

LONDON, May 3. Extension of daylight saving time in Great Britain to two hours instead of one hour, as at present, is forecasted in an announcement in the London Gazette this evening. The order for setting clocks forward has not been issued, but it is expected, as a measure for coal conservation as a result of mine strike.

### NEW OFFER BY GERMANY.

LONDON, May 4. A new German offer to the Allies was telegraphed Tuesday from Berlin to the German Ambassador at Paris, for communication to Reparations Commission, according to a statement ascribed by the London Times to good authorities. Terms of the offer are not known, but it is presumed they are approximate to acceptance of Allied decisions at Paris on January Twenty ninth.

### NOT OVER BRIGHT.

WASHINGTON, May 3. Reports from all districts in Shipping Board, to-day, officials said, indicated as far as the ship movement was concerned that the situation was generally satisfactory. In New York, officials said, some difficulty was being experienced as strikers were picketing best recruiting offices, and in Baltimore.

more the situation seemed rather unsatisfactory.

### FANATIC FIGHT.

JERUSALEM, May 3. Rioting at Jaffa on Sunday, in which Jews and Moslems were killed, was renewed on Monday. Martial law has been declared. The total number of persons wounded Sunday and Monday, was two hundred and twenty-seven.

### ONE FIFTH REDUCTION.

NEW YORK, May 3. The wage rates of day laborers at manufacturing plants of United States Steel Corporation will be cut about twenty per cent, beginning May sixteenth, Herbert H. Gary, Head of the Corporation announced to-day. Other rates, including salaries, will be adjusted equitably, added Gary's statement. Estimated at \$65 dollar and forty cents per day per man cut, the announced cut will mean a reduction in the payroll of not less than one hundred and fifty million dollars per year.

### NORTHLIFFE ON IRELAND.

LONDON, May 3. Lord Northcliffe speaking before representatives of United States Dry Goods Association, who are visiting this country, to-night, declared that misunderstandings between Britain and United States are largely due to misapprehensions in United States press, and should be cleared up through frankness and co-operation. With reference to Ireland, Lord Northcliffe said: "We are offering Ireland very generous terms. I believe they are well understood by United States and United States sympathisers with Ireland should urge Ireland to accept them. Ireland is asking for the impossible, probably for more than she expects to get. If you can imagine the feelings of the people of United States on hearing that Long Island had decided to cut completely loose from the Union, you can imagine our views as to granting Autonomy to Ireland."

### BREAKING THE STRIKE.

NEW YORK, May 3. Two United States flag steamships, one a passenger liner, the other a bunker oil carrier, left here to-day on scheduled sailings. This was the first break here in a countrywide strike of Marine workers, called to combat reductions in wage scales. While high Union officials and steamship owners were in Washington waiting conference with Government officials, Union organisers here continued efforts to effect further cleups of United States flagships.

### VOTED DOWN.

BERLIN, May 3. A motion to immediately consider United States reply to counter proposals on reparations, made by Dr. Simons, was lost by a large majority in the Reichstag this afternoon. The reply was received this morning. Newspapers are almost apathetic as regards the note from Secretary Hughes. The Nationalist Press charges "I told you so," and reproaches Simons for lack of dignity in appealing to Harding.

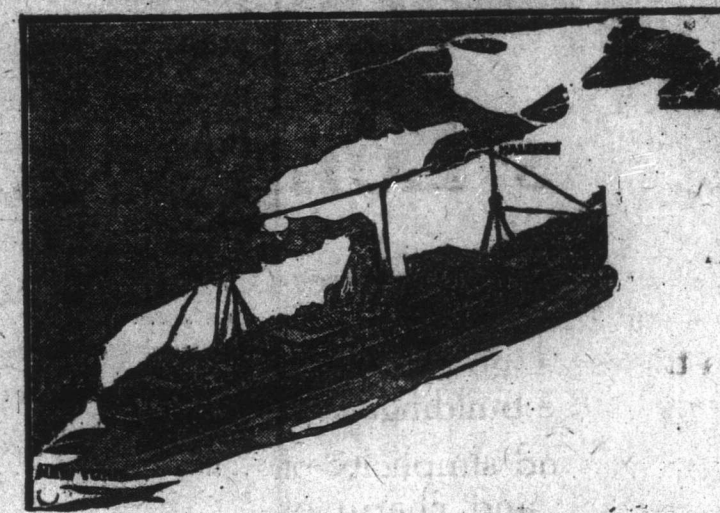
