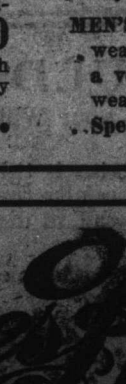
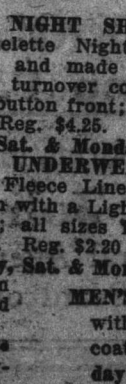

Taking a Fleet Out of Harbour

(Daily Mail.)
To the man in the street, it is a very simple operation to take a fleet out of harbour.

The ships are all at anchor on a moment; the next they are steaming in perfect order out to sea.

There is more in it than meets the eye.

The evolution of getting a fleet out of harbour involves no little organization and is not merely a case of pulling up the anchor and ringing down to the engine-room.

The admiral will have signalled the time at which the fleet will proceed to sea. It is necessary that every ship shall be ready at the exact moment a certain little string of flags at the masthead of the flagship is hoisted down.

This string of flags is the "executive signal." It is hoisted to give just sufficient time for every ship in the line to have a chance of seeing and acknowledging by an "answering pendant."

Let us see what preparation has been necessary before any single ship feels qualified to hoist her "answering pendant" in obedience to the signal.

To begin with, all the boats must have been hoisted and lashed securely in place, for it may be rough outside.

A "lifeboat" on each side of the ship must be ready to lower instantly with the crew in it in case of emergency.

It is probable that every boat will have been necessary for the commander to calculate precisely at what time his last boat must leave the shore, in order to get back in time to be hoisted and secured.

The arrangement of boats requires a great deal of organization, for the postman must be landed in time to catch the latest possible mail, and to get down from the post office after collecting the letters.

Then there are officers and men from leave to come on board, and to be landed for marketing and brought off again, various other ships have to be visited, and, last but not least, a boat must be kept in readiness for the flagship in case she should take it into her head to demand one at the last moment.

The engine-room staff required to try their engines shortly before getting under weigh, and there must be no boats alongside while this is being done, for they would injure themselves in the wash of the crew.

Again, the engine-room staff must be warned at what time steam will be required for working the main derrick, the capstan, the fire mains (which are needed for washing the cable down as it comes in lest it should bring mud into the cable lockers).

Torpedo nets must be secured, and covers must be laced over the masts and yards to protect the paint from smoke. And a hundred other little items have to be arranged and made to fit in with the precise moment at which the order is given to weigh anchor.

Once the anchor is off the bottom the ship must be kept in position while she awaits the order to proceed.

The flagship hauls down the signal when she herself is ready, and with one accord the engines of the various ships begin to move.

The fleet is proceeding out of harbour.

Suicided From Olympic.

Passenger Plunged Overboard in New York Harbor.

New York, Sept. 1. (Canadian Press.)—Family troubles in England and the fear of being detained and sent to Ellis Island, were believed to be the cause of Thomas Braxington, of New Castle-under-Tyne, England, jumping overboard from the second class deck of the White Star Liner Olympic, Tuesday night, when she was at anchor at quarantine here.

Leaving his fiancée, Miss Anne Louise Thompson, Calif., lying unconscious on the deck.

According to the ship's officers, Braxington was well to do. He was thirty-nine years old and was on his way to Abbotsford, B.C., where he owned a bakery business. Miss Thompson had become engaged to Braxington on the Pacific coast and had gone to England six weeks ago to marry him. There was some trouble with the relatives and the two sailed on the Olympic with the idea of getting married in California before proceeding to Abbotsford.

On Tuesday night the man displayed symptoms of despondency. Just after dark he went to his cabin, and left there his money and jewelry, with a note stating that he was afraid of detention at Ellis Island. He then went on deck where he kept a towel to Miss Thompson. The girl faints and Braxington jumped overboard.
