JANUARY.

The first month of the year present in the calendar contains thirty-one days. It derives its name from the god Janus, who had two faces looking in opposite directions, and the writer Macrobios states that the month was dedicated to him, because, from its situation, it might be considered to be retrospective to the past and prospective to the opening year. The consecration of this month in Roman days took place by an offering of meal, salt, frankincense and wine, which was new. On the first day all enmities were suspended, presents were exchanged and consuls and other state officers installed. January was not however, the first month of the year in the British Isles till the reformation of the calendar in 1752, when Parliament by an Act altered the mode of reckoning time from the Julian to the Gregorian style. At this period it was directed that the legal year, which commenced in some parts of the country on March 25 (Annunciation) and in others 25th January, should thenceforward be appointed to begin always on January first. The principal festivals observed in this month are, 1st, New Year's Day, Feast of the Circumcision; 6th, Epiphany, Twelfth Day; 25th, Conversion of St. Paul. Minor festivals of Saints are, 3rd, St. Genevieve; 8th, St. Luce; 13th, St. Hilary; 18th, St. Prisca; 20th, St. Fabian; 21st, St. Agnes; 22nd, St. Vincent and Anastatus; 27th, St. Chrysostom.

January is particularly rich in historical events, some of which had a marked effect on the nations of the world. Joan of Arc, Maid of Orleans, under whose leadership France was freed from English sovereignty, was born on the Feast of the Epiphany in 1412. Louis XVI. of France, was guillotined during the "Reign of Terror," under the guise of democracy, on the 21st, 1793. Marshal Joffre, the great French soldier, was born on the 5th, 1852. William Pitt—the great Commoner of Britain—died on the 23rd, 1806. General (Chinese) Gordon, killed by Mahdists at Khartoum on 26th, 1885. "The battle of Abu Klea in the same campaign was fought nine days previously in the same year. The Crimean War in which Britain, France and Turkey were allied against Russia, began on the 27th, 1854. The Inland Penny Post was inaugurated in Great Britain during this month in the year 1840. The Great War was officially terminated on the 10th, 1919. The opening of the British Museum took place on the 15th, 1759. Admiral Earl Beatty's birthday is on the 15th, he being born in 1871. Britain's Premier David Lloyd George, is another celebrity owing January for his birth month, his natal day being the 17th and year 1863. On the 18th, in 1912, Capt. Scott, R.N., triumphed over the difficulties and dangers of Antarctic travel and reached the South Pole. In the Peninsular War of 1812 the "Iron Duke" Wellington won one of his most famous battles

at Ciudad Rodrigo on the 19th. German Zeppelins raided the East Anglian coast of England on the same day, 1915. On the 22nd, 1901, occurred the death of the great and good Queen Victoria, whose reign exceeded that of any monarch in English history. On the 28th, 1881, the battle of Laing's Nek in the first Boer War was fought. The Victoria Cross, that much coveted decoration was instituted on the 29th, 1856. Paris capitulated to the Germans on the 29th, 1871. On the 30th, 1649, Charles Stuart, King of England, was sent to the block by a judicial court of the Protectorate, his death warrant being signed by Oliver Cromwell. The Anglo-Japanese Treaty was signed on the 30th, 1912. A great man and a great preacher passed away on the 31st, 1892, in the person of Rev. Charles Haddon Spurgeon. These are but few of January's events, yet sufficient to give cause for thought and research.

Newfoundlander Honored.

Rev. P. W. Browne, a native of Carleton Place, Ontario, has been honored by the University of Washington with the title S.T.D. (Sacerdotal Theological Doctor). Aftermaths of Fire.

VICTIMS HEAVY LOSSES.
All those living in the houses which were gutted by fire last night, have incurred heavy losses. The building in which Yuen Lee had his laundry and the Thorne family had rooms, is owned by Mr. S. Ryall. There is insurance on the building. Neither Yuen Lee nor Thorne had any insurance on their furniture and the case of the latter is a particularly sad one as he has lost all his belongings through damage done by water and fire. The building in which Mr. Stacey had his house and shop belongs to an estate for which Mr. J. Fenelon is agent. It is insured with Gibbs and Barron. Stacey had \$1800 insurance on all his effects, and as everything was destroyed, and his "fish and chips" machine was alone worth \$800, his loss is a severe one. Defective wiring is thought to have caused the fire.

The schooner "Mark Gray," owned by the Burt Export Company, went ashore at Wood's Island yesterday. She was towed off by S.S. Portia. The "Mark Gray" had a full cargo of Scotch pack herring. No further particulars have been received concerning the extent of the damage suffered by the schooner as result of her accident, but it is presumed the vessel is all right.

A man was called upon to appear before Judge Morris this morning on a charge of deserting his wife. The woman did not appear against him and the case was dismissed for want of prosecution.

A husband charged with leaving his child destitute did not appear. He has been summoned.

G. W. V. A. Raffle.

As a result of the raffle held by the Executive of the G.W.V.A. during the Christmas season, 160 families of ex-service men and their dependents have been given relief. The raffle proved a big success, the total receipts amounting to \$4,961.20 and the net profits after deducting all expenses in connection with the undertaking amounted to \$768.34. This amount was immediately distributed and went a long way to make the festive season more cheerful for the soldiers and their families.

Cheques in 2400 B.C.

(Daily Mail.)
The ruins of a Babylonian colony dating back 2400 years before the Christian era, have been discovered at Kolisa Nyek, in Asia Minor. The remains discovered prove that the community which lived there was partly military and partly commercial. Cuneiform inscriptions give many curious details of the organization of the city, which was governed by a prince and a prefect, assisted by a princess and a female prefect, whose powers are said to have been precisely equal to those of their male colleagues. The city was known to its admirers as Birus and seems to have been one of the earliest homes of female emancipation. Records of a regular postal delivery service have been found, the letters being written on baked tiles of a circular shape. References to an early form of the cheque system have been discovered a bearer cheque being found which contains instructions to the addressee to pay to the person named in it a stated sum.

The Union Jack.

Great public interest will be evoked by the news that the College of Arms is considering whether a change in our national flag will be requisite as the result of the creation of the Irish Free State.

The Cross of St. Patrick was introduced in the Union Jack in 1801, after the union with Ireland, as an emblem of that union. Should it be removed the appearance of the flag would be transformed. There would remain a red St. George's Cross with a narrow white edging and a white diagonal St. Andrew's Cross on a blue ground. We should return to the flag which was used throughout the eighteenth century, and under which Nelson fought the battle of the Nile. To many this will seem a sentimental loss, as round the flag in its present shape ten thousand associations have gathered with the years. The present Union Jack is the "meter flag" which our Navy covered with glory in the wars of the early nineteenth century and for which a million of our race died in the Great War. But in the nature of things there is no absolute necessity for such a change. Hungary, which occupied in relation to Austria the same position as the Irish Free State will occupy in regard to England, was content to have the same war flag. None of the Dominions has abandoned the Union Jack; in their flag they combine it with some distinctive sign. There is the same question to be considered whether the official title of the State to which we belong will remain the United Kingdom, or whether it will be necessary to revert to the designation of Great Britain, which was employed before the union with Ireland, having originally been introduced by James I. If so, this will be another sacrifice made by the British people in the cause of a full and complete reconciliation with the Irish race, such as is now hoped will follow the agreement with Sinn Féin.—Daily Mail.
