Finds Greece

Big Problem.

NEW YORK, Feb .- Greece to-day presents "one of the most tremendous refugee problems the world has ever known," says a statement from Lt.-Col. William N. Haskell, American Red Cross commissioner to that country, included in a report made

public here to-day. Fresh from a tour of investigation of all the principal seaports. Col. Haskell cabled that there were at least a million refugees in an area whose entire population did not exceed 5 -"there are as many refugees as normal population in cities and towns, and in some instances the normal population has been doubled or

tripled by the refugees.
