CHARLES NIPPER OF FOGO LOSES HIS LIFE.

On Saturday, 31st October, there was a sad accident when Charles Nipper, a native of Fogo, lost his life while attempting to cross West Brook. The deceased, who had been in Mr. Brown's employ for a number of years, was taking a horse up around the head of the bay while Mr. Brown, who is one of the mill-owners here and one of the most prominent men in the place, made the trip by motor boat to South Brook, intending to meet Charlie there with the horse and then proceed to Twin Lakes, where he is extensively engaged in logging operations. When Mr. Brown arrived at South Brook and found that Charlie did not come, he began to feel anxious and feared that something untoward had happened. He at once started in his motor boat round the bay to try and find out what was wrong.

On reaching West Brook what was his dismay to see the horse that Charlie had in charge grazing on the river bank, his condition showing only too plainly that some dreadful accident had taken place. The reins were broken, the saddle twisted right underneath him, and both horse and saddle streaming wet. Mr. Brown guessed only too well what had happened and searched all around to see if he could discover any sign of the body, but could find no trace of anything except the marks of the horse's hoofs leading in and out of the river. He then went back to Springdale for help to make a more thorough search, but by the time the search party arrived on the scene darkness had set in and they could discover nothing.

However, next morning they were more successful and at an early hour the body was discovered lying on its face in a deep pool of water. It is supposed that the horse must have taken fright and thrown him right over his head, but this is mere supposition and it will remain one of those mysteries which can never be solved. The pool in which the body was found was no wider across, it was in fact a little overfall, the water being very shallow on both sides. Charlie was well acquainted with the place and had made the trip round the bay times without number.

"Charlie," as he was familiarly called, was well known and liked by all who knew him. In him Mr. Brown lost a faithful and efficient servant and great sympathy is felt for him on Tuesday in the Methodist cemetery, in his loss. The funeral takes place on Tuesday in the Methodist Cemetery, Mr. Brown is having him laid to rest in his own plot, and doing all in his power to show respect to his memory.

Communication Suggestions.

I would like to say just here that this emphasizes more strongly than ever the need of having the road completed round the bay from South Brook to Springdale. As it now is people wishing to go from here to Twin Lakes or Badger, have to make the trip from here to South Brook in motor boat and send their horses right round the bay a distance of about eight miles, besides having to ford Indian River, South Brook and West Brook where poor Charles Nipper lost his life. There is a great amount of traffic on this road, even now, and there would be more if it were completed to Springdale as it should be. The cost would not be very great as there is a road on the north side of the bay which could be utilized to a great extent.

I wish also to call the attention of the authorities to the pressing need of a telephone system between South Brook and Badger. This is a much needed improvement and one which it is urgently hoped the present Government, in their desire to further the interests of the people, will speedily accomplish.

The A.N.D. Co. have already established telephone communication between Badger and their logging camps at Twin Lakes which is proving a great boon to the men who are working there.

Star Card Party, Supper and Dance

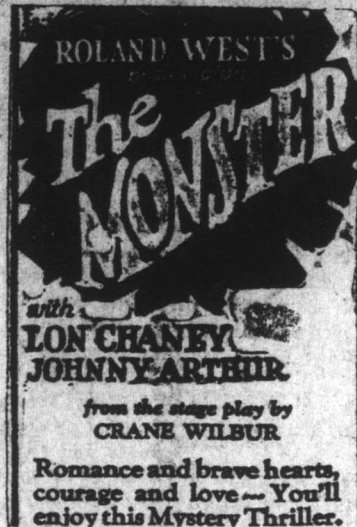

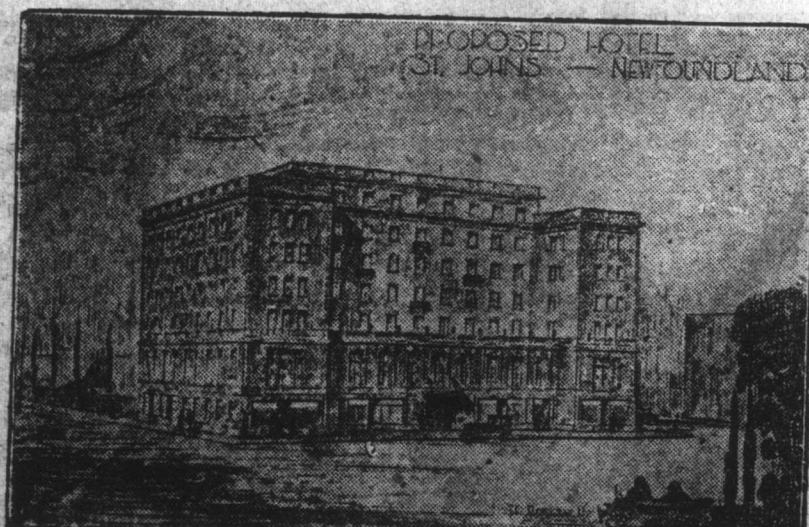
