SOCIAL PROBLEMS AND THE CHURCH.

velopment of social service departments of the various churches. The resentful and somewhat sneering remarks of these ministers are not, however, convincing proof that Dr. Ward's efforts will be misdirected and unnecessary.

The letters of the reverend gentlemen already published in The Albertan indicate that the church has already enlarged its program to include a great deal of work outside of that of preaching the gospel. But they are not convincing proof that the church has been successful in keeping pace with the problems of the community.

The church in Calgary is making an effort to meet the conditions and to create much-needed social centres; but that effort is, in most cases, puerile; and it was with this fact in mind that The Albertan called attention to the effort of another institution to come to the assistance of the church. The church has nothing to lose, and may perhaps gain a great deal by accepting the proffered cooperation of Calgary University toward the expansion and improvement of its social service

church's efforts so far. The Sunday school, as it exists in almost every church in Calgary today, is a very good example of what the church can accomplish along any direction with trained leaders and proper equipment. 
