

SCIENTIFIC REASON WHY A WOMAN CAN OUT-TALK A MAN.

A woman can talk longer than a nan, and does so, because she uses less force by a considerable percentage than the man does.

A professor of science has proved by actual and very delicate measurements that the baritone singer uses far more energy than the tenor, and that the bass singer uses more force than either. The range of voices differs greatly, so the percentage varies to the same extent, but as a general result it was proved that the tenor uses only from one-seventh to one-sixteenth of the lung power of the baritone or bass.

The difference between the force used by the contralto and the soprano is quite marked, and the conralto who sings in very deep tones uses at least ten times the force of the thrilling soprano.

The explanation is so simple that it s surprising that the investigation was not made long ago. It has long been known that the tenor or soprano brings the vocal cords close ogether and keeps the edges only vibrating by the emission of air. The bass or contralto leaves the space beween the cords wider open, and has to vibrate much more of the membranes to a considerably larger mount of air required.
