HARD TIMES IN FRANCE.

A Large Number of Laborers Cannot Find Employment,

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12 .- That the Americau workingman has not been the only sufferer from hard times is made apparent by a report to the State Department from Stephen H. Ingell, United States commercial agent at Roubadi, France. He says that the figures of the central labor bureau at Paris show that the labor situation throughout France on Aug. 15 last appeared to be that a large number of workmen and laborers were without emdleyment, only a small portion of those who have for some time been in enforced idleness having resumed their occupations. From 645 labor unions, with a membership of 129,235, reporting to the central office, is appeared that 14.4 per cent of the laborers were without work. Of these unions 53 report the situation as worse than last year. In the agricultural districts 67 per cent of the laborers were without employment, and in the wine districts of Cher and Herault this percentage was increased to 75 and 80 per cent respectively, the crisis resulting from the low price of wine. During the year 39,085 new pensioners were added to the rolls and 2,398 previously dropped were restored, while 37,951 have been dropped for death and other causes, and on

June 30, 1894, the number of pensioners upon the rolls were 969,544. The number of pension certificates issued during the year was 80,123, and 132,873
