WORK AND WAGES.

Detroit Carpenters Compromise—Shooting at Strikers in Chicago.

Detroit, March 19.—The carpenters' strike is settled, and the men will all go back to work this morning. Superintendent Jansen offered the men \$2 a day for nine hours' work. They had been getting \$1.75, and wanted \$2.25. They offered to compromise for \$2.12½ but Jansen was firm. There is only about two weeks' work to be done on the building.

Chicago, March 19.—Nearly 2,000 tailors hitherto unaffected by the strike quit work yesterday. About 60 shops are affected. It was reported at strikers' headquarters that all employed on special order work for custom tailors had gone out. The strike is in sympathy with that of the cutters. The tailors also demand the 25 per cent increase in wages asked by the cutters. Bloodshed was narrowly averted in a clash between the striking tailors and Hyman Kaufman. Kaufman fired three shots from his window at the men, but hit none.

ADVANCE IN COAL.

Operators Form a Percentage Pool on

Lake Shipments.

Columbus, Ohio, March 19.—About 50 coal operators and shippers from Ohio and Western Pennsylvania met here Tuesday night and agreed to form a percentage pool on lake shipments of coal. These operators represent about 98 per cent of the lake coal trade, amounting to about 4,000,000 tons of coal annually. Under the agreement the coal operators get 40 per cent and Pennsylvania operators 60 per cent of the trade. Prices will be advanced about 25 cents on the ton, and the miners will share in the advance.

Was Cruelly Jilted.

Now Joe Has to Pay Her \$475 for

Heart Damages.

The Story of the Courtship—Had a Queer

Way of Wooing at Times—May

Have Put His Arm

Around Her.

Whitby, March 19.—The first case on the list of the jury sitting at the High Court of Justice here was an action for breach of promise of marriage brought by Nellie Hannah Clyde, of Reach, against Joseph Hodgson, of Whitby township. At the last sitting of the court the case came up, the plaintiff claiming \$5,000 damages. After hearing a mass of spily evidence, the jury awarded the plaintiff \$1,000 and costs, but some objections to Justice Robertson's ruling were sustained, and a new trial was ordered. When the case was called yesterday the counsel stated that a settlement had been made out of court, by which the plaintiff gets \$475 and pays her own costs, and a new trial was ordered.

THE EVIDENCE WAS.

The evidence was to the effect that Miss Clyde went to act as servant in the Hodgson family in March, 1891. A month afterward Hodgson left a slip of paper on the windowsill and signed to her to pick it up as he went out. It was a request that she should sit up till he returned at night. She did so, and when he returned he sat on a chair next to her, and put his head in her lap. "This," said the plaintiff, "was the first intimation I had of his love for me." Defendant afterwards told her that if he had a home of his own he would make her his long single, to which she replied, "You would not marry a hired girl, would you?" He said he would.

One night, in August, 1893, the defendant proposed marriage at once. They drove to the girls' mother's, and after supper drove on to Manchester, to take the evening train to Toronto and get married. At the Manchester railway station the defendant asked Miss Clyde to see what time the train would pass, while he put his horse into a neighbor's barn, where he would leave it until they returned from Toronto married. The plaintiff says that when she came out of the station she saw Hodgson driving away, and he deserted her five miles from home, where she had to walk. After that he never had anything further to do with her. The letters, a number of which were read at the trial, showed that both plaintiff and defendant were apparently attached to each other.

THE DEFENDANT'S EVIDENCE.

Joseph Hodgson, the defendant, when sworn, denied the plaintiff's evidence in many particulars, stating that he never spoke to her about marriage in his life. He admitted driving her to Brooklin, and after settling some business, found her waiting for him on the sidewalk, crying. He admitted writing to Miss Clyde, but it was principally at his mother's request. He always wrote to the servant girls after they left, if they asked him. He did sit on his knees sometimes, and she sat on his.

WOULD NOT DENY KISSING HER.

He had put his arms around her several times, and would not say he never kissed her. He may have put his arm around her on his way from Brooklin, and may have said a good many things to her, but nothing about marrying her. He had some talk to his father about marriage the spring before the old gentleman died, and his father offered him the crop if he would get married, but never mentioned Miss Clyde or any other girl in this respect.

HENRY HICKMAN'S STORY.

Henry Hickman swore that he had worked for Wm. Hodgson; that the plaintiff had taken him there. He had a conversation with her in June, 1895, when she told him she was suing Hodgson, and if she got it plaintiff and Hickman were to get married that fall and have a good time. In cross-examination he still claimed that he and Miss Clyde were engaged to get married. Further evidence he got in the form of throw doubts on his former statements, and the judge dismissed him, remarking that his evidence was simply scandalous.

William Hodgson, a brother of defendant, testified that the plaintiff and his brother were evidently fond of each other, and used to sit occasionally on each other's knees.

It is stated that the fair plaintiff is disengaged with the settlement of the case.
