The co-operative creamery system must continue to grow in magnitude until a large proportion of all the milk produced is worked up at central points. Centralization is the order of the day, and nowhere is it more evident than in dairying. There will be some increase in the system where private dairymen supply individual customers with butter, but there is a limit in this direction, while for the factory system there is none.

The bringing together of milk from off 100 farms to one central point means that 100 farmers' wives are relieved from irksome labor, and in place of 100 kinds of butter in as many style packages, each paying heavy express charges, there is one lot, of uniform quality, shipped at low rates in the refrigerator car.

Who shall control the creameries? There is a natural desire among farmers in these days to control their own business, and who can biame them for it? The farmer's accupation in a measure prevents him from being a careful, shrewd business man in the usual sense of that term. His work is to produce rather than to barter. In consequence of the desire among farmers to manage their own business, we have seen scores and hundreds of co-operative creameries spring up in the west.
