At the Result of British Elections.

Afraid Chamberlain's Success May Cause Trouble.

Expects to Recoup Her Treasury With \$14,000,000 From China-The Dicker for the Danish West Indies

WILL CHINA PAY? Paris, Oct. 11.-The French revenue for the nine months ending with October shows a surplus of \$23,400,000 over the estimates and an increase of 1899. This increase will be nearly all The squire pushed his coffee cup credits, which already amount to \$14,-000,000, but the Government expects to make the Chinese pay this.

THE DANISH WEST INDIES. London, Oct. 12.-Referring to the mooted purchase of the Danish West Indies by the United States, the Copenhagen correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says: "The renewed negotiations will result, I believe, in the purchase. The opposition party in the Danish Parliament favors the transaction, but urges the government to obtain a larger price than the United States previously offered. It is understood that America wishes to use St. Croix as a naval coaling station.'

BRITISH ELECTIONS. London, Oct. 12-3 a.m.-In the pollings in the parliamentary general election yesterday the Ministerialists gained two seats, making their total gains 30, as against 29 for the opposition. In Sutherlandshire Mr. F. S. Leveson-Gower, Liberal Unionist, defeated Mr. John McLeod, Liberal, who held the seat in the late parliament, and in the Southport division of Southwest Lancashire, Mr. Marshall Hall (Con.) wrested the seat from Sir George Augustus Pilkington, who secured it in the bye-election last year. The constitution of the new house thus far is as follows:

Ministerialists 374 Opposition 224 As yet there has been no Ministerialist gain in Wales and no Libera gains in Scotland.

The list of the re-elected includes the nephew and heir of the late Earl of Beaconsfield, Mr. Ralph Disraeli who has represented the Altrinicham division of Cheshire in the Conservative interest since 1892.

Dr. Gavin Brown Clark, the former consul-general of the South African republic and a noted pro-Boer, Liberal, was badly beaten in Caithness-shire, the Liberal-Imperialist candidate. R. L. Harmsworth, winning the seat.

Sir Charles Dilke easily retained his seat for the Forest-of-Dean.

CONTRADICTION. Officials of the foreign office here informed a press representative that there is absolutely no foundation for the report in circulation here that Viscount Cromer had been summoned from Egypt to take a seat in the new cabinet.

AFRAID OF CHAMBERLAIN. Paris, Oct. 12.-The British general election is exciting a good deal of interest and comment in continental Europe. The opinion is universal that it is a personal triumph for Chamberlain, and that if he becomes predomhad no regrets, and that I was most inant in the British Government an era of aggression and jingoism will be inaugurated which will seriously threaten the peace of Europe. In France especially are sober men anxious. It is felt that if in future difficulties arising out of Newfoundland, Siam, Africa, etc., the negotiations are in the hands of Chamberlain, war may easily be provoked, especially as Chamberlain is likely, as in the case of the Transvaal, to refuse all compromise and to offer to settle on the basis of absolute surrender by the other party. After Fashoda, France will never again back down completely, and with Chamberlain at the British helm things are likely to go to extremes. It is im-possible to describe the dislike and suspicion with which Chamberlain is regarded in continental Europe. It is not an exaggeration to say that Britain with Chamberlain as premier would have all Europe against her, hostile and watchful. Many Transvaalers, exiled from Johannesburg and Pretoria, are arriving in Europe ,and the stories they tell of British brutality and arbitrariness also add to the flame. Never before, perhaps, was Britain regarded with so much suspicion.




