to death.

The fire was discovered at 5:20 o'clock, and so rapidly did it spread, that in less than half an hour the mansion was totally destroyed. The fire company at Jenkintown, Pa., was sent for, but it arrived too late to be of any use. The house was filled with valuable furniture, pictures and statuary, brought for the most part from Italy. The house was of colonial

style, and was built in 1826. Meadowbrook Farm was one of the finest country residences in the vicinity of Philadelphia. The pictures in the art gallery are an irreparable loss. Their approximate value is \$250,000, and several of the paintings were specimens of the old masters. One alone, a Charles I., cost Mr. Wanamaker \$43,-

A SUICIDE AT NIAGARA FALLS!

William Gardhouse, of Brampton, Plunges Into the River's Swift Current.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., May 20 .- This afternoon, at 4:35 o'clock, when several hundred people were enjoying the beauties of Prospect Park, an old man who appears to have been William Gurdhouse, of Brampton, Ont., committed suicide by plunging into the river but a few feet back from Pros-

that he had been robbed either in the place or just before he entered. At the time of the suicide Prospect Point was lined with men and women viewing the falls, and right before them, speeding onward to sure death the man passed. Right where the man entered the river, wrapped carefully in a napkin, was a spectacle case with glasses, and a card bearing the name William Gardhouse, Brampton, Ontario, on one side, and R. Morely, 233 Victoria street, on the other. There was also \$465 in money and a card of a local hotel. Inquiry at this hotel reveals the name of William Gardhouse on the register. His description corresponds with that of the suicide. He left the hotel at 2:30 o'clock. He was sixty-six years old, wore dark clothes, and had a grayish beard.

[London Telegraph.] It is a far cry to the days when fair cyclists in knickerbockers were hooted in the streets of Paris. On the 'Boule' Miche," notably, the bloomer

has become so popular that those ladies in the Latin quarter, who go by the name of "Etudiantes," but are, it is to be feared, rarely seen in the lecture room, appear in the summer months to spend their days in cycling costume, but without their bicycles. Now, however, there is a prospect of fresh battles ahead for the advocates of "rational dress," who imagined that they had won the day and routed their enemies totally years ago.

Nothing is to be feared from public opinion, as the most conservative of Parisians have got quite used to seeing their wives in knickerbockers on bicycles. But the authorities in some rural districts have suddenly developed a strong anti-bloomer feeling. 
