PAT CROWE

Offers to Surrender on Certain Conditions—A Counter Offer Made to the Alleged Kidnapper.

Omaha, Neb., Oct. 12.—Chief of Police Donohue received from Patrick Crowe, through a friend of the latter, an offer to surrender himself and stand trial in the courts if the reward of \$50,000 over his head for the alleged kidnapping of Edward A. Cudahy, jun., is withdrawn. The chief is now negotiating with him for surrender. Chief Donohue did not accept the proposition, but made a counter offer to waive the latter and pay, saying nobody else could secure it.

Another dispatch says: The letter came in early afternoon, and was a newspaper man, and covers 15 closely written pages. The letter is illegible, but the chief is now negotiating with him for surrender. The letter was dated this city at 8 p.m. of the same day, "indicating that it had not traveled a long distance. In the letter Crowe agrees to waive himself up at once and stand trial for the kidnapping of Eddie Cudahy, provided he shall not be locked up until a jury shall pronounce him guilty. He says he will not be able to furnish bonds in excess of \$20,000, and demands that bail be fixed at the same.

A SPECIAL GUARD

Appointed by the Afghans for Each European in Cabul—Russia Again Intriguing.

London, Oct. 14.—"A large Afghan force has been assembled around Cabul and is maintaining order," says a dispatch to the Daily Mail from Simla. "Habib Ullah Khan has appointed a special guard for each European in Cabul, directing that the guards shall answer for their lives for the safety of their charges."

"The Indian Government has postponed the usual move to Calcutta, and Lord Curzon has definitely postponed his projected tour."

Habib Ullah Khan, who has succeeded Abdur Rahman Khan, is a strong personality, capable of controlling the fierce Afghan tribes if allowed a free hand. But the question is will Russia take advantage of the present opening to push on to Herat?

The situation contains many dangerous elements. It is altogether too doubtful to justify any definite prediction even as to the early future.

There has been no change of ruler in Afghan history without an accom-

panying civil war. Nor is there any reason, despite the assurances from Simla, to believe that the position of Habib Ullah will not be temporarily threatened by internal intrigue. Should the waves of strife break beyond the frontiers it would be necessary for Britain to enter the country in the interest of order.

Already the Russian press, declaring that Britain must not be allowed to annex Afghanistan, calls for the Russian occupation of Herat, and other important frontier points, "until the country is completely tranquilized."

To do this would require an army of 100,000 men.

POLICY OF RUSSIA.

Russian methods are not likely to take this course. The czar's advisers would be more apt to seek an alliance with the new emperor by means of bribes and of support in keeping the tribes in subjection.

The northern frontier of India, delimited after the Peshawar incident, is supposed to have finally marked the extreme limit of Russian advance. To cross it would be regarded in London as a casus belli.

A LOYAL WELCOME

Civic Reception to Duke and Duchess Was a Happy Event.

Despite the Great Crowds Which Lined the Streets No Accident Marred the Occasion—The Children's Welcome to Royalty.

The royal visitors have come and gone, and London has no reason to feel ashamed of the reception accorded them. Toronto and other cities prepared a more elaborate welcome for them, it is true, but it must be borne in mind that their royal highnesses' stay in London was a very brief one; that it was brief, however, did not in any way detract from the heartiness of the welcome. It was a welcome such as could be expected from a loyal Canadian community.

It has been a noticeable feature of the royal visit to Canada that it has not been marred by any unpleasant incident. The reception in this city furnished no exception to the rule. Despite the vast crowds of people who filled the streets all day Saturday, and contended for favorable positions from which to view the royal procession, not a single accident occurred. The crowds were extremely good-natured, and notwithstanding the tedious delay caused by the lateness of the royal train, no one grumbled. Apparently but one idea animated everyone, that their royal highnesses should leave the city impressed by the warmth of its welcome to them and the depth of its loyalty.

THE SCHOOL CHILDREN.

One of the most pleasing and impressive features of the reception was the part played by the school children of the city; it is doubtful, indeed, whether any other single incident connected with their royal highnesses' brief stay in London caused them more genuine pleasure than the spectacle of thousands of radiant young faces turned toward them with expressions of admiring devotion.

This detail of the reception had been admirably planned. It was arranged that the children of all the public and separate schools, the model and normal schools, and the collegiate institute, together with the teaching staffs, should assemble in one body at the collegiate institute grounds, corner of Dufferin avenue and Waterloo streets. Long before the hour set for the arrival of the royal party the various contingents began to arrive. It was like the mobilization of a great army, but with this difference, that the weapons borne by the little soldiers were sunny smiles and childish laughter—weapons quite as effective in their way as grimy muskets. The gaily-attired regiment from each school, after having been formed up, marched to the mobilization point, at the Collegiate Institute, and by noon the vicinity of Dufferin avenue and Waterloo street presented an animated spectacle. The army by this time had swelled to nearly 8,000 and each child and youth in that great gathering carried in his hand a Union Jack. The effect was inspiring in the extreme.

The normal and model school and collegiate institute pupils were arranged in front of the institute building. East of them were the regiments from the fourth ward, Princess avenue, Lorne avenue and Quebec street, while the contingent from St. George's school was drawn up on the west side of Waterloo street, facing the east. The detachment from the separate schools, and the school children of the Queen's College, Alderbrook, Colborne street, Talbot street, London West, Simcoe street, Victoria, Wortley road, Grand avenue and King street schools were stationed further north on Waterloo street.

Prior to the arrival of the royal procession the children, by way of rehearsal, or, it may have been, in sheer excess of spirits, sang a number of patriotic songs, including "Soldiers of the Queen" and "Greeting to the King." When at last the head of the procession appeared in view, the mass of children swayed forward like a great tidal wave, and a cheer went up comparable to nothing save what it really was—the shrill-voiced acclamation of children.

The cheer was continued with intermittent force until the carriage bearing their royal highnesses appeared; then, it swept upward again with redoubled force, and the tiny Union Jacks were waved frantically overhead. The duke and duchess appeared pleased beyond measure, and bowed their grateful acknowledgments frequently. As the royal carriage reached the first line of the youthful army the children, singing in concert, began the "Greeting to the King."

When the royal carriage reached Waterloo street, the children began the "God Save the King," and better the last note of the national anthem than died away the whole body was rushing pell-mell for Victoria Park.

THE MILITARY SIDE.

The military side of the reception in London was not striking because practically the whole of the two infantry regiments and the cavalry regiment was required to properly police the streets along the line of the procession. The 7th Regiment was, of course, compelled to remain in Victoria Park to await the ceremony of the presentation of new colors at the hands of his royal highness, The Cobourg Field Battery, which fired the royal salute when the train reached London at 1:05, did not enter into the affair, so far as the public was concerned. It was stationed at the Chapter House, several blocks from the route of the procession and was scarcely seen. The spectators had an opportunity of seeing the in-
