# LOCAL MARKET.

London, Sept. 22.

"It was a awful market," was the expression used by Market Clerk Baker this morning when asked regarding the size of the market. The market used in the construction of the road on Talbot street occupied a considerable space which might have been occupied by some of the farmers' wagons. As it was the attendance today was a record-breaker and eclipsed the Christmas market. There was enough stuff offered today to supply a city twice the size of London. Some were brisk in some lines while in others the demand was slow. On the whole, considering the large amount of stuff offered, there was a fair amount of business transacted.

Grain—Oats were in demand today; sales were made at 80c to 82c per cwt. for new oats. Barley sold at 10c to 12c per cwt. Wheat, 75c to 80c per bushel.

Butter and Eggs—The supply today of butter was readily sold; prices were steady at 21c to 22c for cream butter, 22c for pound rolls, by the basket, only the best quality brought these prices. Eggs sold mostly at 15c to 16c per doz. by the crate and 12c to 14c for small lots of strictly fresh laid eggs sold at 20c per doz. in the open market, and 20c per dozen in the dairy hall.

Dressed Hogs—The demand for the score or so of hogs that were offered, sales were made at 35c to 38c per cwt.

Fruit—In this department there was a very large quantity offered. One dealer had 1,000 baskets left over from yesterday. With the large consignments that were received today, it made a large number of baskets to be disposed of. One would think by the large quantities that were made from day to day that the wants of the citizens would have been satisfied by this time. Buyers seem as numerous as ever, and made purchases of fruit freely. Although sales were fairly brisk at the dealers, other kinds of vegetables were very plentiful at prices quoted.

Poultry—There was a large quantity offered. Sales were brisk at 50c to 60c per pair for live chickens and 50c to 75c per pair dressed. Quite a few sales were made at 65c. Ducks, dressed, sold at 70c to 80c, and occasionally 81c per pair. Live Hens—Prices at the rule were shipment will be 26c per cwt for select. Small pigs sold today at 55c to 60c per cwt.

# HAMILTON ANNOYED CITY BUYING LAND

AT TOOL COMPANY IT ALREADY OWNS

Idea Prevails There That the F. O. Clinch Says Outlay for City Has Been Used as a Breakwater Purposes Is Sort of Catspaw.

The London Machine Tool Company and its reported removal from London are worrying the people of Hamilton as much as the probable loss of the concern is disturbing the citizens of London. The fact, Hamilton appears to be angry on account of the rumor that the firm will locate in Berlin. The Spectator says:

"It looks as if Hamilton had been used as a sort of catspaw by the gentlemen of the London Machine Tool Company in order to enable them to get to the council of the town of Berlin. Either this is the case, or the premature publication of the city's negotiations with the London Machine Tool Company has put some smart man in Berlin next, and the Berlinites have used the London Machine Tool Company as a sort of catspaw."

"Some months ago the assessment commission got in communication with the London Machine Tool Company, and they in time practically decided to locate in this city, picking out the land they wanted and ordering the purchase thereof. Plans for the building to be erected were prepared and tenders asked for and the city council passed the necessary resolutions as to the water, etc. At the last meeting of the fire and water committee it was decided to spend \$1,000 on a new main for the company's works."

The information from Berlin that the ratepayers there are soon to vote on a bylaw to lend the same company \$40,000, and to give it a free land site of eight acres. Judging by the way the matter is discussed in the Berlin papers, it is not likely that the bylaw will be carried.

Hamilton dispatches were considerably annoyed, and had nothing to say. He was not able to get in touch with the London Machine Tool Company, and will wait the matter over with the mayor before he takes any action.

In speaking of the matter today, a local alderman remarked that the city of London can do nothing to keep the ratepayers from voting as they please.

"Berlin as a manufacturing town is not in London's class," said the alderman. "The London Machine Tool Company goes there it will be because of a bonus. Berlin has no other inducements to offer."

"Hamilton might have some advantages over London in the way of cheap freight rates on pig iron brought by water, but Berlin has nothing to offer."
