

Three Months for Indian Listers Who Are Charged With Being Drunk

**Law Is Tightened To Save Those
Who Are Unable To Save
Themselves.**

Magistrate Love and Inspector Galvin still further amended the provisions of the Indian list this morning so as to draw the meshes tighter around those who cannot restrain their appetites for liquor.

Several cases have appeared in court lately where young men who are on the Indian list have been drunk, and will not tell where they obtained the liquor.

This is out of a desire to save the hotelman or whoever supplied them from having to pay a heavy fine.

In future, however, all persons on the Indian list who appear in court for drunkenness will be liable to three months' imprisonment at least, and as much longer as the magistrate

may deem necessary if they refuse to tell where they got their drink.

One Hundred and Fifty Names.

There are at present nearly 150 names on the Indian list.

Several of these are women and the police and the inspector have been at a loss to find out where the ladies get their liquor.

The same applies to all others.

It is a long time since such a vigorous campaign has been waged against drunkenness in the city, and both Magistrate Love and Inspector Galvin are doing a work that every citizen approves of, and are doing it effectively.

The hotelmen of the city are lending them all the aid possible, as no first-class hotelkeeper wishes to have around his house such characters as many of those on the list are.

The Emigrant Traffic Is Very Heavy

Emigrant traffic on the Grand Trunk is very heavy just now and nearly all the through expresses have one or more special coaches attached.

No. 8, the early morning express for New York, went through this morning with three big coaches filled

with Italians and Syrians, all of whom were going back home, and will sail from New York on Thursday.

Express No. 6, going west, at noon, had two coaches of emigrants also bound for New York, and more will pass through during the afternoon.

Burglar Entered Piccadilly St. House

The police were called to the residence of ex-Ald. Neil Cooper, 445 Piccadilly street, about 10 o'clock last night.

Mr. Cooper had gone into the house next door to spend the evening and when his daughter came home about 10 o'clock she heard people upstairs.

She at once called her father, while a neighbor telephoned the police.

Mr. Cooper, fearing the burglar would escape through the back windows, went out into the yard to wait for him.

The burglar was wise, however, and lifting the front window, was seen by Miss Cooper running away. When the police arrived all trace of him was lost.

Hon. Mr. Beck on Cataract Contract

"I see that the Cataract Power Company has offered power at 10 per cent less than our best figure," said Hon. Adam Beck to The Advertiser this afternoon.

"Not long ago, these same people said that we could not offer power for any such figure as we announced."

"Now they seem to think that our figures are higher than theirs."

"I do not think they can compete with us at all."

"We can get cheaper power than they can, and they simply cannot pay dividends on their common or pre-

ferred stock at the rate they quote.

"I suppose they will endeavor to make good, but I cannot see how they can do so with the capitalization they have."

"It will not alter our plans at all. We have stated what we can do, and we are prepared to do it."

"I have received no offer from the Cataract Power Company for power," said Mayor Stewely this afternoon.

"I know nothing of it. We will not be able to discuss the contract with the hydro-electric commission until some time next week, as the revised form of the contract is not ready."

Body Turned Over To Medical School

The remains of the man who was killed on the Grand Trunk near the Cove bridge on the evening of Good Friday have never been identified, and the body has been turned over to the medical school for the use of the students.

It was thought at first that the remains were those of Mark Good, a soldier, who left this city about four-

teen years ago, and who later entered the American army and was through the campaign against the Filipinos.

This, however, proved to be a mistake, and after searching all through the Grand Trunk construction camps in the hope that the man might have been missing from some of them, the authorities decided to turn the body over to the school.

Chatham Man To Succeed Mr. Houston

It is understood that Mr. Robert Scott, of Chatham, freight agent for the C. P. R. will be appointed shortly to the position made vacant by the resignation of Mr. James Houston.

Mr. Scott is well-known through the country and has a fine record as a railroadman.

He is about 50 years old and has been with the C. P. R. for a great many years.

It was stated at the C. P. R. office this morning that he will arrive in the city in a day or two and assume his duties.

European Mormons On Way To Utah

Two special Grand Trunk coaches from Quebec containing 68 Mormons from England, Germany and Norway, went through on Express No. 1 at noon.

The party are all bound for Utah, and comprises 21 Germans, 17 Norwegians and 20 English people.

Many women were in the cars, and occupied the rear portions.

When the reporter went in they were all engaged in singing hymns.

The party is in charge of Elder Moughan, who stated to The Advertiser that his home is in Liverpool.

Cases Entered for the High Court

NEW WATER SCHEME

(Continued From Page One.)

"The filtration plant is a reserve plan. We have a storage basin at Springbank with a couple of millions of gallons in reserve."

Mayor Speaks.

"The scheme we will submit is all right, and is the only solution," said Mayor Stewely, who is not known to the public as a water expert.

"The flow of the Kilworth springs, and the Cronyn and White springs is 1,200,000 gallons, and not 500,000 gallons as the Free Press states."

"Further than that the item calling for the expenditure of \$76,000 for the Cronyn and White springs, in Mr. Maury's scheme, is in part and parcel of that scheme. He put it in and we left it in, and I think it was wise to do. All we have done is add Kilworth and high pressure to Mr. Maury's scheme and cut out the two mains. The cost is a little more but not sufficient to cause worry."

People Want Spring Water.

"As Engineer Moore pointed out in the beginning, if filtration alone is wanted, the south branch was the place to go for the water. There is plenty of it there, and the cost would not be so excessive as the north branch is said to be. However, the people of London want good water, and we went where the good water is. I think the scheme is all right. We have not put it up to be knocked down but we put it up because it is the best scheme, and settles the water problem for all time to come."

"I am thoroughly convinced that that there will be no need of the filtration part of it during my lifetime at least. Mr. Jones was of the same opinion. I wanted, therefore, to cut out the filtration, in as it was Mr. Jones wanted the filtration in, as it would be there in case of emergency. I agreed with his suggestion, and we voted for it."

Commissioner Jones.

"We all want spring water if we can get it," said Commissioner Jones, "a number of years ago, I thought that it could not be obtained in large enough quantities. So we advocated filtration. However, we have now discovered a better scheme, I think."

"It will give to the city enough spring water during my lifetime at least, and when the time comes, and must inevitably, when filtered water must be used, we have it ready. I am convinced that there is plenty of spring water for many years."

"The scheme is the Maury scheme, adding Kilworth and high pressure. The latter does not cost us much, and satisfies the underwriters. That will mean a considerable saving to the city, and will give the city ample protection in case of fire."

"Kilworth was added for the purpose of getting more water. It will cost us \$125,000 to get 500,000 gallons of first-class spring water. When we get it, there will be no expense at all to gather it, as this can be done without difficulty, and expense by the present machinery. It simply means that we have half a million gallons of water that will cost us nothing after the initial cost is paid."

For An Emergency.

"Then we have filtration right at hand in case of emergency. A storage tank capable of holding six million gallons of water in case of fire will be ready to use. It can be pumped into the high pressure mains, and used on fires at once."

"We put the scheme because we thought it best. We want to settle this question not for a day, nor a year, but for all time to come."

Engineer Moore.

Engineer Moore is of the opinion also that the underwriters' rates will be lowered fully 25 per cent. This will mean an enormous saving to businessmen and others. With such a supply of water at hand, and with such pressure, the city will be largely independent of the underwriters, and will be able to get reasonable terms from them."

The date of the vote is not yet decided upon, but it is expected that it will take place early in June.

It can hardly be taken in May, as the bylaw must be advertised three weeks.

NOT A SIGN OF PRIVATE MOIR

"Have" all the American cities along the coast been notified to be on the lookout?" was asked.

"Some of them have," was the answer, "but the matter has not been gone into thoroughly, and won't be until a reward is offered."

"Nothing has been heard of late from the fugitive," said the police officer, "and it is not known whether one will be offered or not. There is always a certain amount of red tape before any action can be taken in matters of that kind, and in the meantime Moir, if he has escaped from Canada, is probably getting a good start."

However, it is not felt that he has crossed the line. "If Moir was moving some one would surely see him," was the way one of the detectives put it.

The London detectives believe that the fugitive is located somewhere between Guelph and St. Jacob, and the first rumor from that direction will doubtless send them scurrying out in a hurry.

Not Their "Funeral"

It was reported today that since the London officers have returned the police in other cities have taken more interest in the Moir case. This may be true, but it is a fact that some of the outside officers encountered shrugged their shoulders when the subject was mentioned to them a few days ago, and replied that "It is not any of our funeral. The London men are after him, let them catch him."

It is a well-known fact that there is much rivalry among the police of various cities, and professional jealousy doubtless had much to do with the antipathy shown by some of the out-of-town police.

In one of the places visited the London officers requested the local police to watch the railroad station closely pending their arrival on the scene. When they arrived they found that no effort had been made to comply with the request. Consequently Moir might have shaved his mustache, and walked up and procured a ticket without detection so far as the police in that particular vicinity were concerned.

Just now all conjectures as to Moir's whereabouts is in vain, for he is absolutely no clue to identify him with any particular portion of this country or the States.

Some day he may be caught, but at present he is apparently safer from detection than he was the day after the murder. Then the officers had been heading for the docks, and knew whether he is on a boat pointed toward the old country, a freight train off for the coast. Again, a few days ago it was certain that Moir was alive. Today he may be lying dead in a clump of woods near Stratford, or a swamp near Heilsenburg. In fact he may be anywhere and everywhere. At all events at present the detectives are absolutely in the dark.
