TO RELIEVE CONGESTION

Suggests Separate Building For Lower and Middle School Pupils.

Build South London collegiate for lower and middle school classes to relieve the crowded condition of the present high school," was the advice of F. W. Merchant, of the department off education, to the board of education at its regular meeting Tuesday

The upper school should be mainained in one building, because the city cannot economically provide more than one efficient upper school department in charge of specialists of the first rank," he said. "At present there are 51 pupils enrolled in the upper school and of these 31 come from the central section of the city. "The commercial department should

not be divided into special schools," he continued. "It should be maintained as a unit. either as an independent school or attached to either the Collegiate or the Technical School.

"My reasons for this are that London is an important commercial centre, and should have a very strong commercial school, and that under the adolescent school attendance act, it

will be necessary to provide part time instruction for a fairly large number of pupils who wish to take commercial subjects. The instruction of these special students can be provided most efficiently and economically in one

"To relieve the present congestion, the accommodation for the commercial school could be found for a time in the technical school if the rooms in this building now occupied by the soldiers' civil re-establishment department for office purposes and possibly also for academic classes be taken over by the board of education. The soldiers' civil re-establishment department could doubtless find office accommodation, and, if necessary, accommodation for their academic classes in other buildings in the city, but no steps should be taken to take away from the soldiers the opportunities which they now have for instruction in the technical school technical school if the rooms in

Secretary R. M. McEiheran stated that the county last year paid 80 per cent of the cost of schooling these pupils, or \$7,000.

LOWER AND MIDDLE SCHOOL CLASSES IN SOUTH LONDON, PLAN

Dr. Merchant Advises This For New Collegiate.

Analysis of the attendance at the Colegiate to determine how overcrowding uld best be relieved has been made Principal W. H. T. Mooney. This shows that 216 pupils attend from East London; 499 from the centre of the city; 196 from South London, and 36 from West London; a total of 947. County pupils number 105, bringing the ggregate attendance to 1.052. For South London.

Dr. F. W. Merchant of the department of education told the board of education Tuesday that he thought these figures indicated that a branch collegiate would be most useful in South London. He advised that only lower and middle school classes be accommodated there, and that the upper school be a unit at the centre of the city.

This plan would guarantee an attendance of 152 for South London. Of the remainder of pupils from that district, 32 attended the commercial school and 12 attend the upper school classes.

Good Attendance.

Mr. Mooney's report for January showed 887 pupils on the roll of the general school with an average attendance of 807. In January, 1919, the number on the roll was 822 and the average attendance 752. In the commercial school last month there were 222 pupils on the roll with an average attendance of 201 compared to 206 on the roll, and an average attendance of 193 in 1919. This makes a total roll of 1,109 compared to a total of 1,028 in 1919. The average attendance, however, was 1,008, compared to 945 in 1919.

Evening classes show increase over 1919. Forty-five are enrolled in the commercial and 34 in the general, a total of 79. Last year there were 46 in the commercial and 28 in the general classes a total of 74.

Unsuccessful Attempt Made To Change Word "Bonus" To Increase.

A \$100 bonus for public school teachers in addition to what increases have already been made in 1920 salaries was approved by the board of education Tuesday. Maie teachers at the col-legiate were granted an increase of \$200 over the salary previously set for 1920, and the women assistant teachers were placed on a \$2.000 salary basis. Techui-cal school teachers were given a \$200 increase.

Committees were asked to consider

committees were asked to consider salaries of school janitors, the collegiate principal, public schools inspectors and the superintendent of works and his employees.

A somewhat caustic discussion pre-A somewhat caustic discussion preceded an unsuccessfu! move to have the public school teachers' bonus made an "increase." Trustee Edwin Smith objected to the word "bonus." He moved that "increase" be substituted, and that the men receive \$100 increase, and women teachers \$150, and that the schedule be so amended as to allow this. Such action would have made the total increases of men and women teachers equal. As it is the men receive \$50 more by the previous increase.
