Where is the mysterious chauffeur, once employed by a prominent Lon-don lumber merchant, whose seeming interest in the Wyoming bank robbery of October last was materially responsible, it is claimed, for the apprehension of Edward A. McMullen, George Anderson, John Yohn and William Ayers, the four alleged bandits, who now pace their cells in the Lambton county jail awaiting the morning of June 13, when the machinery of the law will be given another turn and they will commence a grim legal battle for lib-


