SARNIA WORKMAN KILLED BY FALL

Samuel Body Falls to Death When Chimney Scaffolding Breaks.

Special to London Advertiser. SARNIA, Sept. 1.—A fatal accident occurred this afternoon at the Imperial Oil Refinery, when Samuel Body, 254 Confederation street, fell 40 feet from a scaffolding to the ground and expired almost immediately. Joseph Whaley, another employee of the company, was removed to the hospital, suffering from injuries to his head. The two men were erecting scaffolding inside a chimney, which it was the company's intention to demolish. They had reached 40 feet when the plank on which they were standing broke without warning, and the men fell to the ground at the feet of John McPhail, who was about to call a message to them. Body was a young married Englishman with two young children. It is not expected the injuries sustained by Whaley will prove fatal.

ANOTHER CHILD IN AUTO WRECK DIES

OTTAWA, Sept. 1.—Another victim of the fatal train and automobile collision at St. Francis street crossing, Hull, last night, died here today.

He was Hector Ouellette, aged 10, brother of Lucien Ouellette, aged 12, who was instantly killed when the train hit the automobile. Of the four boys on the motor truck, when the accident occurred, two were declared by the authorities at Sacred Heart Hospital to be in a very dangerous condition.

RAILROAD BRIDGES PUT UNDER GUARD

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Sept. 1.—All railroad bridges here were under guard today, following the uncovering of what is believed to have been an attempt to blow up the Cuyahoga River bridge of the Belt Line Railroad.

New York Central police reported last night that they had been fired upon when they surprised four men digging a hole three feet in diameter and five feet deep near the central support of the bridge south of the city limits.

SAYS GERMANY BLEEDING HERSELF TO DEATH

Alberta Professor Gives Impressions After Trip From Abroad.

SEES COMPLETE RUIN

Dr. J. F. Coar Predicts Collapse Will Come This Winter.

NEW YORK, Sept. 1.—Dr. J. F. Coar, professor of political economy at the University of Alberta, upon his return from Europe on the S.S. Reliance today, predicted that winter would bring the utter financial crash of Germany.

"Hugo Stinnes, Voegler, Siemens, Deutsch, Duesberg and other capitalists and manufacturers of Germany with whom I talked," said Professor Coar, "said that a year ago they were optimistic; today they are hopeless. The late foreign minister Rathenau was in a similar mood when with me a few days before his assassination."

"Germany, with her factories humming and her products selling abroad at low prices, is slowly bleeding herself to death," Professor Coar said. "A moratorium would give no help, for it would mean perhaps the stabilization of the mark, and when that goes back to its proper place sales abroad at bargain prices will be over. Then 12,000,000 workmen in Germany would be unemployed."

"Dividends at 24 per cent in German banks are deceptive," Professor Coar said, "for that means but two and a half per cent at the American value."

"In reality," he concluded, "Germany has given away to the world, without recompense, 12,000,000 labor hours during the last year, through her present system. This constitutes an absolute total loss."

WOULD FORCE GERMANY.

NEW YORK, Sept. 1.—"It is incredible, yes, it is more than that—it is monstrous for any one to believe that France seeks in any way to avoid paying her war debt of honor to the United States," said Henri Aubepin, representing the Barreau de Paris, which corresponds to the American Bar Association, in an interview just before sailing for Paris. Mr. Aubepin, who is one of the most noted lawyers of France, came to the United States recently to attend the convention of the bar association held at San Francisco.

"There is a malign influence at work, without question, seeking to undermine the existing friendship between America and France," he continued.

"Just who and what is behind this movement it is not difficult to guess. I shall mention no names, but if this friendship could be nullified, it might work to the advantage of certain interests who would be glad, for reasons of international politics, to see France deprived of the good will of this country."

"Nowhere in this country have I seen the slightest evidence of this reported unfriendly attitude of the United States and its people to France, which is an evidence that the movement to create ill-feeling between the people of these countries is not having much, if any, effect. The origin of all this exists overseas, and it is there that the chief efforts are being made to create trouble."

"In 1870 the Germans ravaged and captured our country. They laid upon France an indemnity the amount of which was crushing and France was even then not rich. But she paid Germany every franc she owed."

Will Pay Debts.

"Can it be believed that France would now seek to repudiate the debt she owes the United States, her friend, not her enemy. Germany was, and still is, a country to whom she owes her salvation, through the loan of money and the use of millions of her troops in the world war? The thought refutes itself. France will pay America every dollar due; but all we ask is time in which to do this, for France is now poor."

"As for the militaristic attitude of France toward Germany, we only ask that Germany pay us what is our due, according to the treaty executed. Germany can pay—if she honestly wishes to. When one has a debtor who can pay but will not, then force must be applied to collect the obligation. If Germany persists in not paying her honest debt then no one can blame France for taking steps to guarantee such payment, and that is what the French people intend doing. There can be no other way."

LACK OF COAL TO CLOSE SOO PLANT

SAULT STE. MARIE, Mich., Sept. 1.—The plant of the Algoma Steel Corporation at Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, will close down tomorrow for an indefinite period, notices posted in the plant announced today.

Fifteen hundred workers will be thrown out of employment. Shortage of coal is given as the cause.

THINK SMALL ARMS PACT NON-EXISTANT

League Headquarters Discusses Refusal of U. S. To Ratify Convention.

GENEVA, Sept. 1.—The refusal of the United States government to ratify the St. Germain convention for the restriction of private traffic in arms and ammunition was the principal subject of discussion at headquarters of the League of Nations today. From the talk the view seemed to be that the convention was regarded as dead.

The news of the declaration of the United States government to adhere to the convention was received Thursday night in a note from the state department, dated July 28.

China, Chile, Brazil, Finland, Guatemala, Greece, Peru, Siam and Venezuela already have ratified the convention, but as none of these countries manufacture arms this fact is regarded as immaterial.

Other countries, Great Britain, France, Italy, Japan, Poland, Canada and Czechoslovakia, had notified the secretariat of the League of Nations that they would ratify the compact when the allied and associated powers had signified their intention of ratifying.

The full committee on reduction of armaments of the league had the state department's note of declaration before it today, but took no action on it.

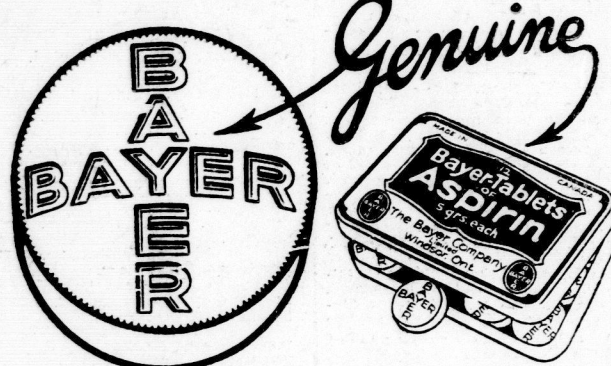
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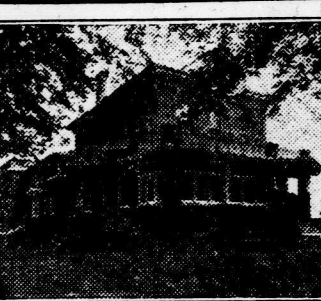
