PERSONAL VIEWS

John Joynt, M.L.A., for North Huron, was the speaker at Hyatt Avenue Methodist Church on Sunday evening, taking for his subject the temperance situation in Ontario.

Rev. M. McCormick, pastor of the church, in a short address, stated his own position in regard to the O.T.A. "I like whiskey as I like Paris green. There are some who claim that the O.T.A. is on too high a plane and that it cannot be enforced. We might as well say the same thing about the ten commandments. There is need for a deepening of public interest in the worth-while things of the country. There were 10,000 people saw a silk stocking revue in a local opera house in the performance of three days, and that is more than attend prayer meetings in this city in six months. I am in sympathy with the O.T.A., and I think we should keep it where it is, and I am in sympathy with every move to preserve it."

Mr. Joynt started in right at the outset to play the liquor traffic. "I have not one good word to say for the liquor traffic," he stated. "It has not one redeeming feature about it. The liquor traffic owes the people of Canada a great deal. Show me the money that has been made through the operation of the traffic, and I will show you the sorrow, and the heart-breaks of a nation. There is not one good word that I can say for it."

Greatest Act.

"The government at Toronto knows where Joynt stands on the question. I think the O.T.A. is the greatest act we ever had. I know there are cases where it is hard to enforce, but so is the law against robbery or anything else. It has done good and the result can be seen right in Toronto. I have been in Toronto since February 6 of this year, and I have seen only one drunken man on the streets. Years ago I would have seen a dozen or more of them every day. In my own village of Lucknow I have not seen a drunken man in two years, although at that time we have had a number of very large gatherings there. Yet there is a society of wet men who say who have the audacity to say that there is as much drinking going on as ever."

Mr. Joynt then touched on the question of revenue, referring to the plea that if we had government control we would have lots of revenue from it in Ontario. "I notice that in Quebec, where they claim to have this revenue, that they have found

it necessary to put on a tax of two cents per gallon to pay for roads.

"A man came into my office a few days ago and he wanted to pay \$300 on the mortgage on his farm. I asked him how he was getting along, because I knew him in the days before the O. T. A. when everything he had went for drink. He has paid off \$800 on a mortgage for a better farm, and is doing well."

Personal View.

Coming to the government stand on the O. T. A. Mr. Joynt made it clear that he was not speaking for the government, but as a private member of it. "I have personally advised the government to leave the O. T. A. alone, and I am as confident as I am that I am standing here tonight that the people will sustain by their votes that measure as they did in 1919. Before I came here I had to square myself with my own pastor in Lucknow, for he had written me a very strong letter because I voted for the enabling legislation that the government brought in. I did so because I have such respect for the attorney-general, whom I consider the most independent man in the house. We don't know what's going to take place; the government gave me no commission to bring a message to you, but as in the days when Nelson found himself in between the fleets of France and Spain, we must send out the clarion call that every man must do his duty."

Mrs. Padden, president of the W. C. T. U., was one of the speakers of the evening. "I come to you as the representative of the largest women's organization in the world, the W. C. T. U. We have been called fanatics and cranks, but it is a fact that even yet the old crank is sometimes of more use than the present-day starter."

Mrs. W. A. Tanner, president of the Union Mothers' Club, gave assurance that the mothers represented in the organizations in the city would be a force contending for the maintenance of the O. T. A.

Mrs. Rose, president of the Local Council of Women, did not speak with the idea of committing the various organizations centered in the one she represented to any particular view. "As a mother and a citizen, though, I cannot refuse my personal influence in this matter. I feel very strongly that the O. T. A. should have a longer trial, and I am convinced that it should remain in force. There are very few mothers or parents who would not view with alarm any move to tear down the enactment now on the books."

LAD IN CAR THEFTS
BAILED FOR MONTH

Magistrate Gives Decision When
W. Haskette Appears in
Court Today.

Wellington Haskette, one of the boys accused of theft of an automobile last month, did not have to join his companion Norman Tucker in the Reformatory as a result of Magistrate Graydon's decision in police court this morning. Tucker, the ringleader of the youthful gang responsible for a series of petty thefts, was sentenced last week to two years but Haskette was let out on bail for a month.

Haskette was ill at the time his friend was sent down. When he came up this morning the court asked him if there was any reason why he should not be dealt with in the same manner as Tucker. Haskette made no reply.

His parents being in court the magistrate decided to give the case a private hearing.

PROTEST REFERENDUM
FOR TEMPERANCE ACT

Passes Resolution.

Protesting against a referendum on the Ontario Temperance Act, the Women's Missionary Society of Dundas Centre Methodist Church at a recent meeting passed the following resolution, to be sent to the premier, the attorney-general and the local member, Sir Adam Beck.

"Believing that, in these crucial days, it is incumbent on every organization of Christian women to proclaim its attitude on the temperance question:

"Therefore, resolved that we the members of the Women's Missionary Society of the Dundas Street Methodist Church, London, declare ourselves to be unalterably opposed to any policy that tolerates, under any form of license or permission, in any section of our province, the beverage sale of intoxicants."

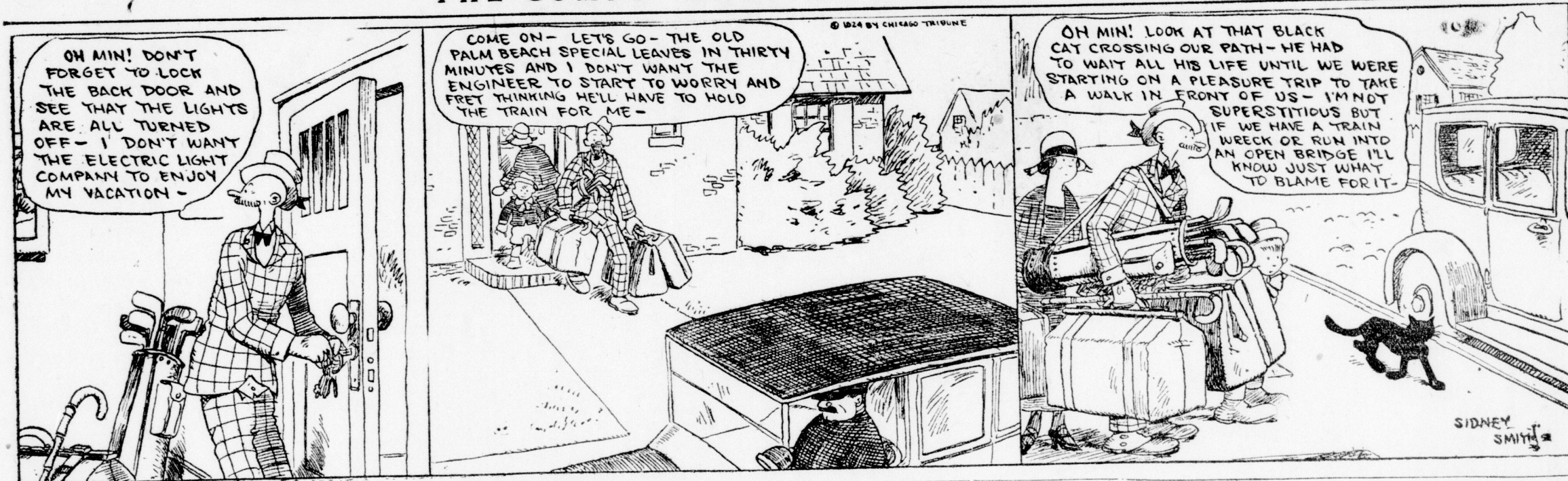
Mr. Dulmage lived at 48 Beaconsfield avenue with his son, who is his only survivor. He came to this city from Port Arthur only a short time ago.

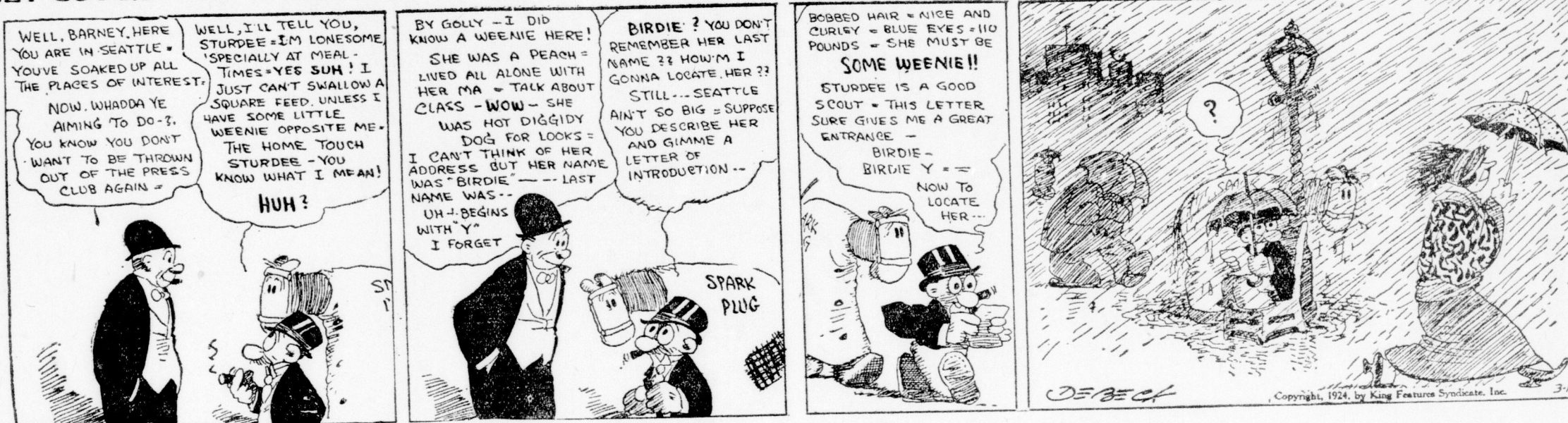

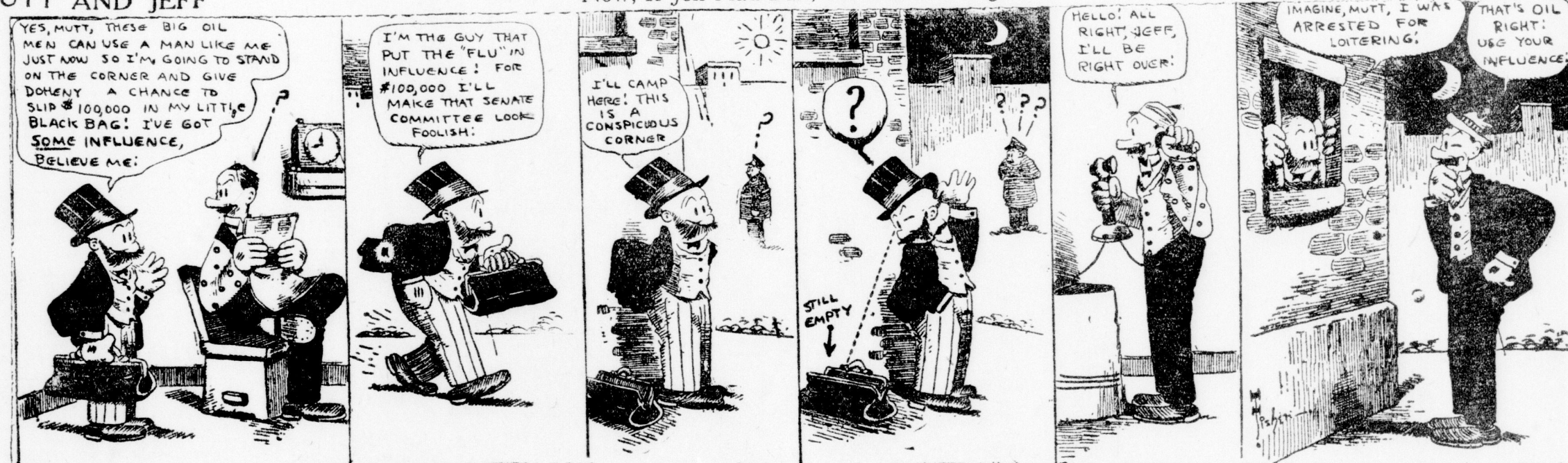
