BRUCE COUNTY PIONEER ANSWERS CALL OF DEATH

Warton, April 10.—Mrs. Henry Atkey, one of the early pioneers, was buried at Oxenden, three miles from Warton on Wednesday afternoon. Born in Yorkshire, England, she came to Canada with her parents when 14, married in 1867 at Owen Sound, and she and her husband walked 26 miles from that city to Oxenden through bush, carrying their few belongings.

She started housekeeping in the wilderness with only one other white family, the district, Henry Atkey, labored as missionary in what was then an Indian reserve, and also taught school. They were Oxenden residents for 44 years, and when the husband died 13 years ago the widow went to live with her daughter, Mrs. Searle, in St. Thomas, where she died on Tuesday at the age of 82. She is survived by four sons and four daughters.

Saginaw and Grand Rapids evidently are not going to be left behind in the M.-O. League shuffle. Both clubs are preparing to start the year right by choosing their teams from a host of both experienced and inexperienced players, and the Billhobs, especially, are having a grand time trying to gather a pennant-winning assemblage.

Manager Al Bashang, of the Aces, will have 30 recruits report to him at Cincinnati Monday, when Saginaw's training season gets under way. Transportation for this number has already been forwarded to President Clements. Three of these, "Lefty" Carmen, "Rube" Messenger and Frank Matuzak, will lead the Aces.

Most of the others live in Ohio, Indiana and Illinois, and will be able to get to "Cincy" on Monday by leaving home Sunday.

Manager Bashang has already made arrangements for quarters for the team in a hotel at Norwood, a town about 15 miles outside the Reds' home, and about 15 minutes ride from St. Xavier field, where the Aces are to train.

Over Grand Rapids way, the fans are beginning to sit up and take notice. Bill Morrissey has promised the fans a winning outfit, and from the plans he is making at present, he bids fair to carry out all his promises. For weeks the Billhobs' boss has been digging around for a team and yesterday he announced that he had gathered a crew that should prove one of the best in the league. Nearly every player signed is over 5 feet 11 inches tall, and fully half of them are over 6 feet.

Morrissey is convinced that the bigger they are the better they are, and therefore, he has tried to get them all that way.

There will be two veterans on the line-up this season. Bob Roper, third baseman, and Bert Grimm, pitcher, were turned back by the Chattanooga club of the Southern League. The pitching staff now numbers fifteen. Several of them are rookies, who are not expected to have much chance with some of the older chaps. Principal among the pitchers are Oscar Johnson, premier hurler of the Central League last year, Mohney, the big underhand twirler, who has with the club for a while, and a chap named Hedge from the Blue Ridge League, and Pete Teske, now with the Kansas City Blues on their training trip, will also fight for jobs on the staff.

Earl Brown, also of the K. C. team, and formerly with the London team, and Russell "Hinky" Haines, who pitched an innings no-hit game for the Texas last season, will be with the club, together with two young semi-pros, Hospodar and Clyde Miller.

To replace "King" Clancy at first base, Morrissey has signed a towering six-footer named Frohman, who is in training with the Kansas City club. Frohman is a full-blooded Indian, and according to advance dope, should win a berth. Harding, another first sacker from the Blue Ridge League, will try out for the position, as will Bockskopa, from Topeka, in the Western Association; McDaniel, from Millsfield, O., and Tom Lowry, of Chicago.

For second base, Morrissey has Tom Rathjen, now with Portland in the Pacific Coast League, or Tom Savage, the property of Kansas City. The latter hit .405 in the Southwest League last summer. At third Roper will have opposition in Pete Van Boven, former University of Michigan captain, or Charlie Tuck, well-known in the Mint League.

There are two candidates for the shortstop position in Connolly, formerly owned by Detroit, and who played part of a season in the Central League, and Bowdolski, who was formerly the property of Milwaukee. In the outfield, Heving, of Kansas City, is to give a year's seasoning. Quelfin, from the Pacific Coast League; De Voss, of last year's team, and Hendron, a semi-pro from St. Louis. Several others are expected to report shortly.

The Grand Rapids pitchers are to report next Tuesday and the rest of the squad begins work the following Thursday.

RATEPAYERS VOTE FOR WIDE STREET AND BOULEVARD

Mayor and Engineer Near Meet Wellington Street Residents Last Night.

Mayor Wenige and City Engineer Near met the ratepayers of Wellington street at Simcoe Street School last night. About 50 men and women attended the meeting. A lively discussion took place concerning the paving of the street between Horton street and Clarke's bridge.

Two paving schemes were submitted to the people, and City Engineer Near placed mechanical drawings before the ratepayers for their inspection. Cross-sectional drawings were made on a blackboard, clearly indicating the final results if either scheme was adopted.

Plan one provided for a road 32 feet from curb to curb. It allowed eight feet for a car track, leaving twelve feet on each side for road space. Plan two called for a wide street and boulevard, where car tracks would be set apart from roadways by curbs. Eighteen feet would be given over to the car tracks, and 20 feet would be the road allowance on each side. Vehicles would not be able to use the car tracks under this scheme.

A motion to accept plan number one, on the chance that it might not be paved this year, was lost, 12 for and 18 against it.

A motion to accept plan number two, with the provision of equalized boulevards, was carried, 16 for and 14 against, but there was much dissatisfaction on the part of those who refused to vote either way on scheme number two.

The meeting was called for 7:30, and soon developed into a heated discussion, and it was not long after Mayor Wenige suggested questions being asked that he had to insist on order, so that some definite ideas on the paving subject could be brought out.

Though there were not many present who favored either of the two plans proposed, several people stood up for variations of both plans. Some wanted the plans to include a double track for the future, and this brought up the question of how long the center of the street would remain with a pavement under such a plan.

One ratepayer moved for a vote of confidence in City Engineer Near, the speaker stating that the engineer was more thoroughly versed in all questions of road work, and knew infinitely more of the future conditions that would have to be met than any of those present. He was voted down by others, who rose to state that while they were in sympathy with the engineer, they too had come to speed hand thrash out a point that was of vital interest to them as residents and business men of Wellington street.

The street railway came in for a lot of criticism, and many questions were put forward as to what might be expected of the company in regard to the paving of the street space allotted to the car tracks. A brief argument followed. Several people wanted to know if the street railway could be made to carry out their part of the work.

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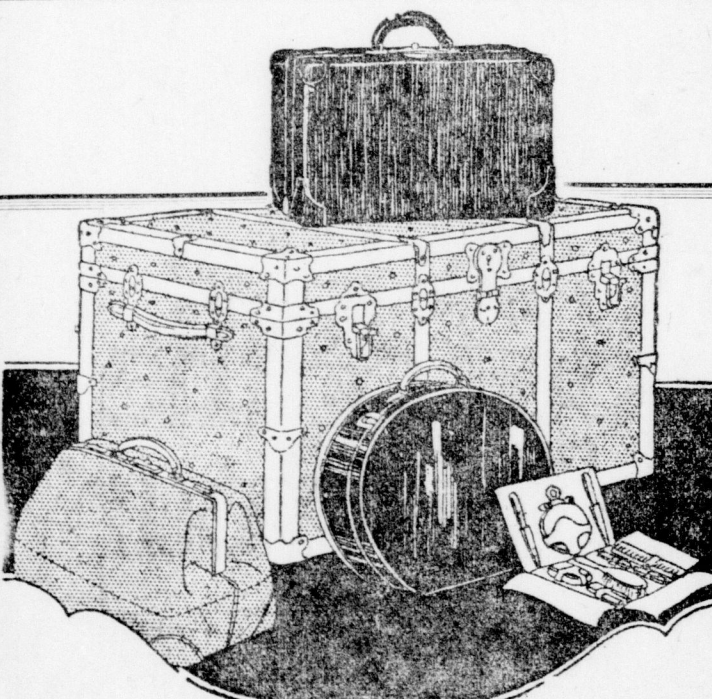
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
