

WOOD-WORKING CONTEST FEATURE OF HOBBY FAIR

Crowds Witness Competition*
Between Public School
Boys Last Night.

MUSICAL EVENTS

Great Variety of Dogs and Cats
Shown in Pet Stock
Tent.

Ten thousand people have visited the Hobby Fair at the armories. The attendance thus far exceeds the total number of people who saw last year's exhibits. More than 750 persons passed through the gates yesterday afternoon, and by 9 o'clock another 2,500 were inside. An additional 500 arrived before 10 o'clock, making the total nearly 4,000 for the day.

The added attraction of two musical evenings today and Saturday with nineteen classes crowded with entries for the musical competitions will prove a great drawing card that should attract a large record and pile up a grand total. Last night's woodworking contest of public school boys proved a great attraction. Crowds were lined up five and six deep around the enclosure, while the boys turned out splendid examples of carpentry work that amazed the onlookers.

Time Limit Made.
The time limit for the woodworking tests was one hour and a half. In that time the boys of the public schools had to complete a two-compartment bird box. While those of the Technical School made a foot stool. There was therefore no time to be lost, and an amazing incident took place when the Central Collegiate orchestra began the National Anthem in opening their program. With the first strains the boys started to attention, hesitated, remembered the time limit, and the competition and quickly came to the conclusion that being within the enclosure they were out of bounds, and the crowd was with them. It was so that long after the contests were over the people were loth to leave and stayed to see the judges take up the difficult task of deciding the winners. The quality of work was of such a high standard that it took the judges some little time to choose the winners and measurements for their decision.

The pet stock tent was filled with an eager crowd of feline fanciers. The cats on the other hand displayed little enthusiasm, but dozed peacefully or assumed poses of quiet dignity, while others looked up at the bored Sydney Webb's Persian tom, the bronze medal as the most beautiful cat in the show, a splendid example of a prize pussy worthy of a high place in any cat show. This cat stands a good chance for the silver medal as the best pet exhibit of any description, if some entry among the dogs or chickens does not step in at the last moment and take the honors.

The best cat of the common or garden variety was shown by Harry Morton, whose cat, named of neither long hair or family tree, it was just entered as plain everyday cat, and as such was a beauty.
