They are getting new ideas in household furnishings which will transform the old rooms at home just as soon as they can make husband's pocket see as they see. They are being introduced to electric washing machines which were but a dream a few weeks ago, and it will be hard not to make the dream a reality by the purchase of one of these remarkable devices for the saving of labor.

What To Wear.

Noticeable in the fashions display are gowns elaborately embroidered with beads. Hats are medium-sized, as if the season had not yet far enough advanced to decide whether the head covering should be large or small. Among the furs is a predominance of small choicers for early fall wear, while the luxurious fur coats shown are trimmed with a contrasting pelts—Indian tan and gunmetal gray are to be the popular colors for these autumn, according to the hosiery displays at the Fair, although all of the peach, tan and gray shades are being shown. Shoes are still strapped, but much simpler in design than hitherto, while dresses are showing a tendency to a more normal waistline and slight circular flare at the bottom of the skirt.

Women, too, are interested in the very fine display of basketry, the work of the soldier patients at Westminster and Byron hospitals. Beautiful hand-carved pieces of furniture are part of this amazing exhibit which is located in the Women's Building. Nearby is the exhibit of the excellent needlework of the women of Western Ontario, much of it attracting the attention of passers by who pause to gaze on the fine workmanship.
