

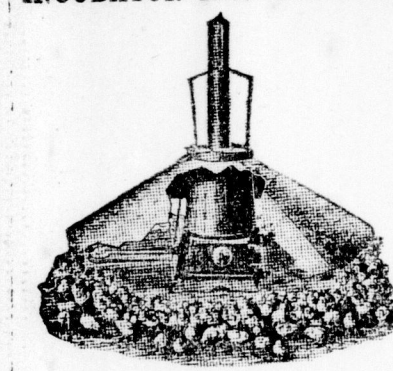
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REPORTED IMPROVED.
County Treasurer Capt. Tom Robson, who has been confined to his home for several days with a large carbuncle on the back of his neck, is reported as being improved.

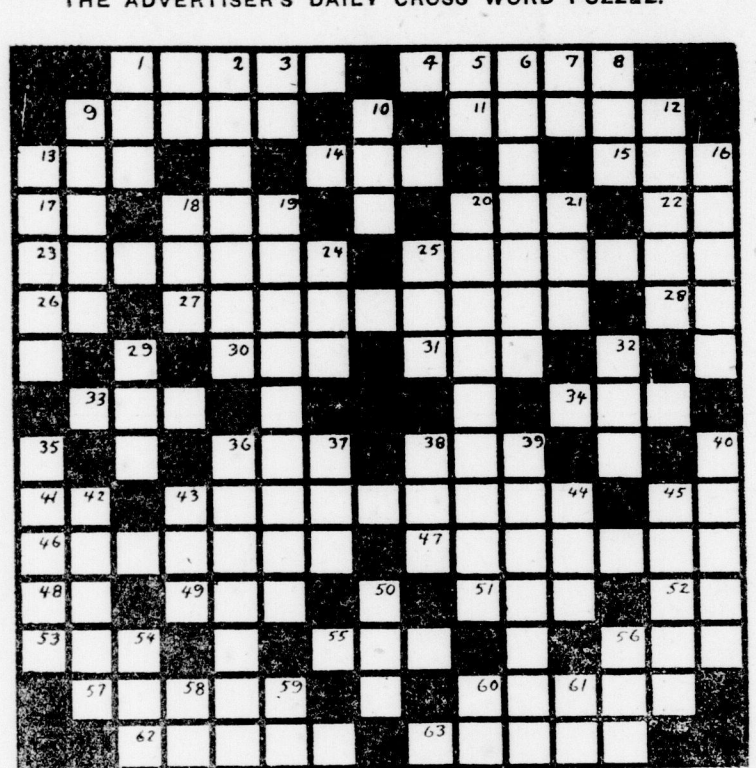

WILL STAND TRIAL ON TWO CHARGES

J. Watson Held in Connection With Robberies at Kerwood and Belmont.

James Watson was committed for trial by County Magistrate Hawshaw yesterday afternoon on two charges of breaking and entering. Watson pleaded not guilty in both cases, and asked for trial by jury. The evidence yesterday was therefore in the nature of a preliminary hearing.

Watson is charged with breaking into the store of W. C. Barons, Belmont, on November 19 last, and the Kerwood creameries on September 16.

The prisoner will be tried at the spring assizes, opening on March 16 at the court house, should he remain in jail. If he gets bail, he will not be tried till the county court sessions in June, Crown Attorney Albert Judd, who prosecuted the case yesterday, declared.

Ran Out of Lane.
Governor Byron Dawson of the county jail identified Watson as the man who ran away from the house of Mrs. Jane McCulley on the Hamilton road, when officers raided her home on November 26. The head of the jail stated that he was standing on the sidewalk in front of the house when he saw Watson run out of a lane and turn west.

Questioned by W. B. Henderson, acting for Watson, Governor Dawson said he had known the prisoner to see him for a number of years. Watson was minus his coat and hat when he ran out of the laneway, witness declared.

High Constable Wharton told of the raid on the McCulley home, and the finding of \$600 worth of goods, alleged to have been taken from the Barons' store. He also declared that butter boxes, found at the house, had the same numbers on them as those stolen from the Kerwood creameries. Some \$200 worth of butter was stolen from the creamery.

Mrs. McCulley and Dauris Sweeney, who were in the house at the time, were arrested and are now out on bail until the June sessions, on charges of receiving stolen goods.

Prisoner Silent.
Both Sweeney and Mrs. McCulley were interested spectators at the hearing, and Mrs. McCulley chuckled audibly, when Watson replied "I got nothing to say," when asked by the court if he had any statement to make.

Barons told of the robbery of his store, his evidence being practically the same as that given in the McCulley and Sweeney hearings.

C. L. Hessel, clerk at Sterling Bros. wholesale shoe company, said that the shoes shown in court were similar to those made in a shipment to Mr. Barons.

Mr. Henderson consented to the depositions, taken in the McCulley hearing from W. R. Pollock of the Kerwood Creameries, being used in the Watson case.

"I think there is sufficient evidence to commit Watson for trial," declared Magistrate Hawshaw at the conclusion of the evidence.

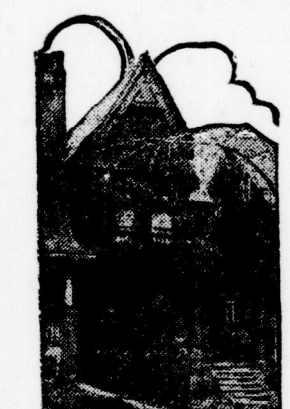
A HOUSE PAINTING TEST

Painted with Cheap Paint at \$4.00 per gal.

THE COST

To paint this house (2000 square feet two coats) with a cheap paint, it required 6 1/2 gallons at \$4.00 per gallon - \$26.00
It took a painter 6 1/2 days to apply the paint at \$5.00 per day. The cost was \$32.50
Total \$58.50

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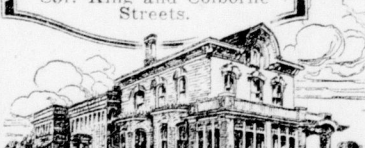
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
