Great Parade To Cathedral Marks Battle Anniversary and Honors Soldier Dead

2,000 March, Including Veterans of All Wars and Militia.

DEAN TUCKER SPEAKS

Declares Amusements Greater Harm To Race Than Militarism.

A great parade of veterans and militia, 2,000 strong, to St. Paul's cathedral, yesterday paid homage to the nation's soldier dead and commemorated the tenth anniversary of the second battle of Ypres, that unforgettable engagement in which Canadian troops first helped to stem the tide of enemy hordes in France. Ten years have passed. In ten years have come devastations and bloodshed of war, ultimate peace with honor and the fruits of that victory. Ten years have passed since Canadian troops covered themselves with glory at Langemark and St. Julien. But yesterday memories were fresh.

A parade of veterans, militia and permanent force units made up one of the largest assemblages of troops and veterans gathered in London since the war. Service at St. Paul's Anglican cathedral found the great edifice crowded to the doors. At the armories, the city hall and along the route of parade to Victoria park and at the cathedral, great numbers of citizens, not quick to forget the sorrows and glories of war, gathered. Showers spoiled the fine spring weather that generally maintained interest and was hampered by the need for cover as each recurring period of rainfall came, though every police traffic officer Chief Robert Birrell could muster was necessary to keep open the parade route when the delayed procession got away from the city hall just before 4 o'clock.

Col. E. C. Dean, acting divisional commander, led the parade, with Mayor Wenize at his side. Members of the London command, G. W. V. A., had gotten away to an early start because of inclement weather. They mustered 300 strong, with Thomas Essery, Penian raid veteran, in command. Squire Chittick, another Penian raider, and a member of the Northwest Rebellion and the Boer war, marched with the Great War veterans.

West Seeding Ahead of 1924

Winnipeg, April 26.—Taken as a whole, spring seeding conditions in the three prairie provinces are the most satisfactory for several years, and ten days to two weeks ahead of 1924, states a report issued by the Manitoba Free Press yesterday. Though operations have been delayed for the past few days on account of wet weather, there is an excellent prospect, says the report, of all wheat being seeded before May 15.

D. No. 1 assisted.

Amusements Harmful.
Love of amusements will bring greater harm to Canada than will any "militarism" which is now felt at the maintenance of school cadets or boy scouts, Dean Tucker impressed during his brief and eloquent commemorative address.

He discommenced fears of some Canadians at the showing of war paintings and war photographs, and discredited arguments that school cadets and boy scouts would hasten the country to another war.

Christendom was praying for the averting of war. But pacifism was an ideal in a real world that is filled with crookedness and perfidy. One nation could not reasonably disarm, while others all around maintained troops and armaments.

"Disarming the nation would be like leaving the sheep without a shepherd in the midst of the wolf

pack, like taking away the policemen while there are burglars abroad.

"Civil war is rife in our country. In Sydney the families of coal miners are starving. There is the great danger of covetousness. There is greed and love of worldliness, with a total forgetfulness of God. Reluctance to work and a desire for pleasure is a national sin."

"I am more afraid of the motion picture theatre and the dance hall, that is disintegrating the nations, than I am of militarism."

Appreciation of valor of the ancient Greeks, the Romans, the Swiss, the Scots, of the British all down through the centuries, was glowingly expressed by the dean. His charge was to those who had returned from the wars and those who had watched from the fire-side to go on with the battle for freedom and liberty and justice, for which Canada had given many of her brave sons.

Music of Service.
Music of the service was provided by the band of the Royal Canadian Regiment: Overture, "Egmont" (Beethoven), Miss Aida Rose, contralto; solo, "Land of Hope and Glory" (Elgar); St. Paul's choir, under Harry Dickinson, and E. Webster, anthem, "The Reckless" (Kipling), and the pipes of the Canadian Fusiliers, "The Flowers of the Forest."

Drums of the Canadian Fusiliers sounded "The Last Post," and drums and the reveille. Wreaths were laid in the chancel by representatives of the various veterans' organizations. Outside members of 17 units reformed. Bandsmen struck up marching airs, and veterans and troops moved off. Hundreds of citizens stood by. Chimes of the cathedral struck the quarter hour. London had not forgotten.

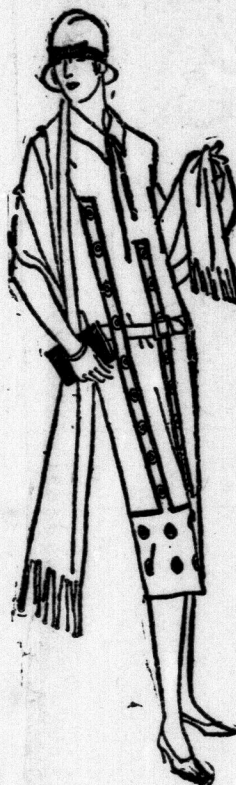
DEATH OF RUMMER WILL BE PROBED

Coroner's Jury To Investigate Shooting by American Immigration Officer.

Sarnia, April 26.—A coroner's jury will inquire into the shooting of Earl Donner, 33, Detroit, by Melville R. Sevy, American immigration officer stationed at Marine City, early yesterday. Donner was fired on when he endeavored to flee in his motor boat after he had been discovered unloading cases of beer at a point between Marine City and Roberts Landing, but the fact that one of the bullets had found a human target was not revealed until several hours later, when the boat was found drifting along the shore with the dead body sprawled on the bottom. Prosecuting Attorney Robert M. Scouler at Port Huron has ordered that Sevy be held as a prisoner at large until after the inquest, it was learned today.

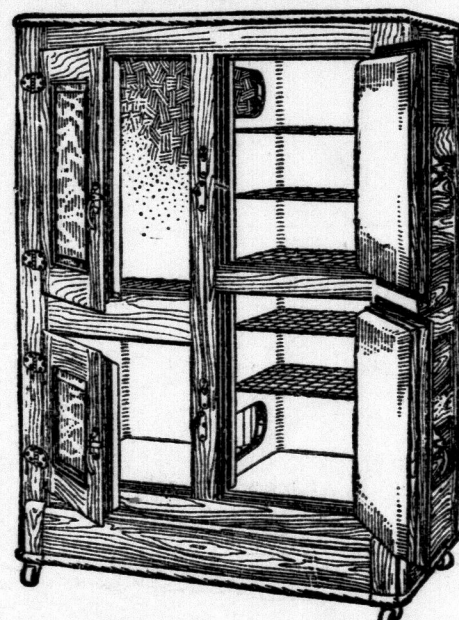

BEATTIE VIVIDLY DESCRIBES SECOND BATTLE OF YPRES

Declares God Guided Canadians and Still Would Lead.

WEARS UNIFORM

Story of War Should Inculcate Desire For Peace, He Says.

In commemoration of Ypres Day, Colonel the Rev. William Beattie, D.D., commander of the Order of St. Michael and St. George, chose as his subject: "The Second Battle of Ypres and Ten Years After." In First Presbyterian church last night. Attired in his chaplain's uniform as colonel of the army, Dr. Beattie pictured in graphic language the second battle of Ypres. He was assisted in the service by Lieut.-Col. Frank B.

Merritt sued for \$500 damages, and the action was heard by Judge Dowley in county court.

Ware, D.S.O., A.A.G., and Q.M.G., M.D. No. 1, who read the Scriptures. "There were many battles in which the Canadians did well," declared Dr. Beattie, in opening his remarks, "but the second battle of Ypres stands out as being unique. It stands out unique, because at that time the Canadians were untried soldiers, and also because of the fact that war

was given a new introduction, gas, which method had not been conceived before. The Canadians by their gallantry saved Britain, and wrote the name of Canada on the illustrious pages of history for evermore."

Decorated For Part.

The congregation listened with an intensity that seemed to surcharge the atmosphere of the auditorium to the recital of the actual battle, which lasted from Thursday night until late Saturday afternoon, as seen by Dr. Beattie from a point not 100 yards behind the line of action. Despite the colonel's becoming modesty in telling his story, it was apparent to everyone present that the part which he played in the battle, particularly as to the directing of the removal of the wounded from the field, was no small one, and undoubtedly worthy of the decoration which later he received personally at the hands of His Majesty King George V.

Dr. Beattie justified his recital on the grounds that the story of the war, even its horrors, would bring this generation to hate war, and to seek the solution of the world's problems and difficulties in some other way.

Praises Col. Ware.
"The divine hand guided our Canadian boys in all their great deeds," concluded Dr. Beattie. "and He is guiding us still. If we would only incline more to His leadership, He would show us the way to interna-

tional peace." Dr. Beattie tendered Lieut.-Col. Ware an eloquent tribute in coupling his name with that of the late Gen. Mercer, whose staff captain he was when commander of the first brigade, "to whom the Canadians owed much for the building up of their army organization."

First church choir, under the direction of G. G. Lethbridge, sang splendidly the anthem, "Hymn of Peace." Calcott.
