Inflammable Oils. The Dominion Government regulations con-cerning the storage of inflammable oils, such as kerosene, naphtha, stc., are violated a good deal oftener than is consistent with safety. These regulations under the Petro-leum Inspection Act of 1880, 43 Vic., chap. 21, prescribe that petroleum or naphtha, in quantities of more than two barrels of the former, and ten gallons of the latter, must be stored in isolated buildings. The regu-lations also require that permits to keep naphtha be procured, and prescribes a penalty for neglect to do so.
