CAPITAL NOTES.

Canadian Aid for the Benefit of the "Victoria"—A Lineman Elected.

Trying to Get Round the Customs Law Under Reciprocal Wrecking Arrangements.

(From our own Correspondent.)

OTTAWA, June 29.—The Government has decided to grant the sum of £1,000 to the Victoria relief funds, as a tangible expression of the sympathy of the Canadian people with those who were bereft by the awful disaster of last Thursday.

A. R. Arnold's case has been further con- sidered. The Government has decided not to interfere with the sentence. Arnold has still six weeks more to serve in jail. It is said his health is greatly suffering.

The Comptroller of Customs has declined to accede to the request of the Hamburg Steamship company to allow American wrecking appliances to be brought to Quebec free of duty, for the purpose of temporarily repairing the steamer Wandram, which was wrecked below Quebec, some weeks ago, in order that the vessel may be taken to Boston to dock there. Comptroller Wallace says there is a first-class dry dock at Quebec, with skilled labor. If the owners want to take the vessel to Boston they must pay duty for the material they bring in. The reciprocal wrecking arrangement does not apply to this case, as the St. Lawrence, at Quebec, is not contiguous water.

Geo. Barbeau, a lineman of the Standard Electric Light Co., was electrocuted this morning. While connecting the broken ends of live wires he received a shock of a thousand volts through his body, and expired immediately on being lifted down from the cross-arm of the pole.

A farmers' meeting to discuss tariff matters will be held at Cornwall the week after next. Several Ministers will attend.

The Department of the Interior has just issued for distribution 100,000 copies of the World's Fair, an official leaflet of information pertaining to the Dominion. It has been most accurately and attractively copied on the inside page consisting of a new outline map of the Dominion in colors, with five pages of reading matter and an attractive lithographed cover. No portion of the Dominion has been overlooked.

The Government steamer "La Canadienne" has just returned from Labrador, and reports the salmon fishing good; cod fishing fair. She broke three blades of her propeller while leaving Esquimaux harbor.

The Government has granted \$100,000 dollars to the "Humanitarian League" for services rendered the shipwrecked crew of the St. John schooner "Osseo," last month.

OTTAWA, June 30.—While rummaging in an old departmental store room today, Dominion Statistician George Johnson came across the original letters patent appointing Sir Charles Metcalfe Governor-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, and re-establishing the Legislative and Executive Councils. The document bears date February 28, 1843, and is attached to it is the great seal of England, in a tin case and weighing about two pounds. Mr. Johnson thinks the document, and attachment would be of interest to the New Brunswick, and proposes to send it to Sir S. L. Tilley, to be placed in the Provincial archives.

SPORTS AND PASTIMES.

Annual Field Sports of Corrig College Attract a Numerous Attendance to Beacon Hill.

The entries were many, all the events were keenly contested, and, needless to say, being broken up day after day, the enthusiasm of the boys was at fever heat. The following were the chief events:

One hundred yards (over 15)—G. Wilson, 1; Field, 2; and E. Erb, 3. Time, 12.6 seconds. This was a capital race, Wilson leading at the tape by only a foot and a half, while two feet only separated Field from Erb, Higgins indeed being only a foot behind.

One hundred yards (under 15)—J. Rihet, 1; Goward, 2; and Peters, 3. Time, 12.4 seconds. Also a very good race, the eight competitors being handily.
