Declaration Day Proceedings At Dalhousie Saturday

Sheriff Opens Ballot Boxes and Announces Results
Declaring Currie and LeBlanc
Elected.

Saturday was Declaration Day at
Dalhousie and a goodly crowd were in
attendance.

The sheriff opened his court at 2
o'clock and announced the official vote
as follows:—

The Sheriff then declared Messrs.
Wm. Currie and Arthur T. LeBlanc
duly elected to represent Restigouche
Co. in the Legislative Assembly.

As the electors present desired to
hear the successful and defeated candi-
dates, Sheriff Stewart was chosen
chairman and called upon Mr. Currie.

MR. CURRIE M. P. P.
Mr. Currie said that the present
moment was one of the happiest mo-
ments of his life, and he desired to
thank the electors for giving him the
great honor of electing him. He hoped
that during his term of office he
would not betray the trust reposed in
him. He said he was particularly
proud of the Tobique and Upsalquitch
vote. True the government candi-
dates had taken a majority in the polls,
but the vote given the Opposition candi-
dates was a cold water vote.—Ap-
plause. He also greatly appreciated
the vote at Balmoral. The manner in
which the electors of that poll had
conducted the election was a great
victory for moral reform. The Dur-
ham vote also was a splendid one, and
he felt sure that had the candidates
been given more time to canvass other
parishes their majority would have
been much larger. Dalhousie to had
done well, and gave the Opposition a
majority. During the campaign there
were a few unpleasant canvasses,
but he thought he would pass them
by, but there was one thing he did not
wish to forget and that was to express
his thanks to the Campbellton Tribune
for its assistance in winning the elec-
tion. That paper by publishing slan-
derous untruths had gained many
votes for the Opposition in the field
covered by its limited circulation. He
wished to remind every elector that he
was their representative. It did not
matter whether they were Liberal or
Conservative, he was elected to serve
them and he would do the best he
could for all. Then when we come to
you again to ask for your votes we
will want you to look up our records
and if we have not worked in your in-
terest turn us out, if we have then
vote for us. He again thanked the
electors for electing him.—Applause.

A. CULLIGAN.

Mr. Culligan thanked the electors
for the splendid vote given him. Al-
though not elected he had no com-
plaint to make, all could not be elect-
ed. When he was elected in 1912 he
tried to do his duty. When four or
five years roll by and if the electors
want him he would be at the disposal
of the electors.

Much had been said of the differ-
ent canvasses used. He wished to
say that in his parish a canvass was

used, which was a disgrace to the
county. A young man who he had
asked for a vote said that he could not
vote for him because if the Conserva-
tives won it would mean conscription
and he would be sent to the war. He

would not say that the candidates
made such a canvass, but it was used.

A. T. LeBLANC, M. P. P.
He thanked the electors for elect-
ing him to the Legislature. When
he had come to Campbellton ten years
ago he had not thought it possible that
the electors of the county would elect
him upon such short acquaintance.
In reply to Mr. Culligan he wished to
state that so far as he or Mr. Currie
were concerned no outside issues were
brought into campaign. This criticism
was of the Murray govern-
ment and its acts. He never heard of
the conscription or national service is-
sues being used in this campaign.
He again thanked the electors for the
confidence they had placed in him by
electing him and assured all he would
do his best to merit that confidence.—
Applause.

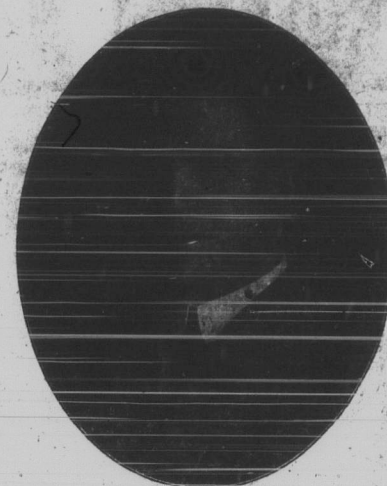
D. A. STEWART
