Mr. W. J. Birks, son of Rev. W. Birks of London conference, formerly organist of Sherbourne street church, Toronto, has recently passed successfully his final examination, and has been elected a fellow member in the international academy of music.

Mr. Birks is returning to Canada, and has been appointed organist of the Dundas street church, London Ont.

Mr. Alfred Lee (better known as Alfredo) of the Western Canada Loan and Savings company, who was lately transferred to Winnipeg to take an important part in the branch in that city, was presented by his fellow-clerks here with a handsome silver watch, etc.

Mr. Molloy wrote the committee that his company would positively make no reductions in their bill. The valves had been ordered by the department, and the price paid was the regular quotation.

At a former meeting Mr. Molloy, superintendent of the pumping works, told the committee that the valves were the best the department ever had.

The long delay in the payment of the bill might have easily been dispensed with, for as a matter of fact, none of the members of the committee appeared to take good notice of the matter.
